

UNION PACIFIC RETIRES FROM COAL BUSINESS

Will Cease to Be a Commercial Distributor After June 1.

The Union Pacific system will soon retire as a distributor of commercial coal, according to advices received in Butte this morning by the local office of the Short Line from D. S. Spencer, general passenger agent, Salt Lake. The official notice runs: "On account of the increased requirements of the Union Pacific lines for locomotive fuel, the Union Pacific Coal company, on June 1, 1917, will retire from the commercial sale of coal from the Rock Springs district."

The announcement of the Union Pacific will affect coal dealers and coal consumers in Butte very little. The Union Pacific sold for commercial purposes only the surplus coal after the

requirements of the railroad system had been attended to. The main supply of coal from the Rock Springs district for Butte comes from the Central Coal and Coke company, it is understood.

Superintendents Confer with General Manager J. M. Rapalje.

Trains on the Northern Pacific Coeur d'Alene branch have advanced as far as bridge No. 41, between Lookout and Wallace, and work has begun on repairing that bridge which was damaged by a snowslide five days ago, according to A. V. Brown, general superintendent of the Great Northern at Livingston, who spent the day in Butte. With Mr. Brown was B. O. Johnson, who arrived last night and left this morning for the east. Mr. Johnson is the superintendent at Livingston.

J. M. Rapalje, general manager of the Northern Pacific, was in the city for a short time last evening in consultation with Mr. Brown and Mr. Johnson, and left last night for St. Paul. With Mr. Brown he had been as far as Missoula on an inspection trip, and Mr. Johnson joined the party here.
