U. S. BY FAR THE RICHEST NATION

National Bank Resources Exceed \$16,000,000,000, is Comptroller's Report.

Washington, March 28.—American national banks have set a new high record for resources, again revealing that the United States is incomparably the richest nation in the world.

Comptroller Williams announced last night that on March 5, the date of the last bank call, the assets of the national banks aggregated more than \$14,000,000,000, exceeding by more than \$5,000,000 the combined resources of the Bank of England, the Bank of France, the Bank of Italy, the Bank of Spain, the Bank of Norway, the Bank of Sweden, the Swiss National bank, the National Bank of Denmark, the Bank of Japan and the Reichsbank of Germany.

The total of all national banks on April 4, 1913, amounted to \$11,000,000,000; the increase of resources for the past four years has amounted to approximately \$5,000,000,000.
