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

247 PUBLICATIONS HAVE SUSPENDED IN GERMANY

Berlin—The total number of German publications suspended since war broke out is 247. Price of print paper advanced about 100 per cent; inks and oils, 30 to 500 per cent, and transportation 60 per cent. Publishers have also granted a war wage increase of 10 per cent.

BRENNAN CASE TO THE JURY TODAY

Defendant Says Crowd Threw Rocks and He Fired to Frighten Them.

The case of John Brennan, charged with the murder of Tony Zanin on the evening of July 10 last in Walkerville, while a crowd of Italians were engaged in playing a game of bauch ball, will be in the hands of the jury late this afternoon.

Character Witnesses. Brennan's cross-examination by County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson did not shake his evidence in any respect.

Albert Dowell said that he had known Brennan for four or five years and his reputation so far as he knew was good.

Mike Doherty had known Brennan for 10 years and said that during that time his reputation was good so far as he knew.

This concluded the case for the defense and the state called in rebuttal a coal office clerk to show that Brennan on the afternoon of July 10 did not order coal as he claimed as far as the books showed.

For the Defense. For the defense Mrs. John Brennan, wife of the defendant, was the first witness. She said that her husband had been drinking steadily on the day of the shooting and he did not eat either breakfast or lunch.
