BIG CARGO SHIP IS SENT DOWN SINCE WAR BEGAN

Two Americans in the Crew of Torpedoed British Ship.

Washington, March 29.—The British bark Neath from Mauritius for Havre with sugar was torpedoed without warning at 8:30 a. m., Tuesday, 23 miles southeast of Fastnet, according to state department reports today.

The British bark Neath, Consul Frost said, "with auxiliary steam power, 4,600 tons, from Mauritius to Havre, cargo of sugar, was torpedoed without warning, 8:40 a. m., 28 miles southeast of Fastnet, sank in seven minutes. No losses or injuries.

"Boats picked up by admiralty vessels three miles off Baltimore, 6:30 p. m., 28th, all saved. Two Americans, Clarence Bloom of San Francisco and Peter Webster, negro seaman of Pensacola, Fla., were aboard."

WHEAT AT HIGHEST SINCE WAR BEGAN

Bullish Crop Reports from the West Send the Prices Soaring.

Chicago, March 29.—Highest prices since the beginning of the European war resulted in the wheat market today from excited buying, due chiefly to bullish crop reports from Nebraska and Kansas. May delivery, which showed the greatest advance, soared to \$1.97 1/2, against \$1.95 1/2 on Nov. 13, the previous topmost record.

Subsequently higher prices than before were reached owing to worse crop reports from Nebraska territory south of the Platte river. Losses of acreage there were said to exceed anything made public this season.

ORDINANCE NO. 1106. An ordinance prohibiting fraudulent practices in selling articles of food, drink, coal, hay or other commodities containing less weight or measure than the package, measure, ton or load purports to contain, and compelling every person, company and corporation selling articles of food or beverages by the package to indicate upon such package in words or figures the true net weight of such articles of food or beverage contained in such package, exclusive of all paper coverings and wrappings.

Section 5. A violation of any of the provisions or sections of the foregoing ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and upon a second conviction of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance the offender, in addition to the penalty herein imposed, shall forfeit his right to obtain a license from the City Treasurer of the City of Butte to engage in business in said city.
