CAMPAIGN CLOSES WOLF CONFIDENT

Says the Republican Ticket Has Excellent Chance of Success.

With the close of the city campaign today, Chairman Wolf of the republican central committee feels that the outlook for the republican ticket is excellent. While there has not been a demonstrative campaign, a lot of quiet work has been done, and the members of the central committee are very much encouraged with the prospects of republican success. In their opinion a large vote will mean the election of the republican ticket; on the other hand, if the voters are indifferent and do not come to the polls as they should, the republicans probably will be defeated. It is merely a question of getting out the vote, say republican leaders.

"We feel confident of victory next Monday," said Chairman John S. Wolf of the republican city central committee today. "We expect to carry the city by a substantial plurality for Lewis A. Smith and the entire republican ticket. The people of Butte, we believe, want a change from the old mismanagement of affairs. They believe that city money has been spent unwisely; that too much has been wasted in purchase of inferior automobile equipment and that the street department has been incompetent. Evidence of this incompetency is found in the flood on the south side, a problem that exercise of good, common horse sense should have overcome."

"The primary election did much to open a breach in the democratic party. In our standard bearer we have an independent candidate, well qualified, a property holder who has Butte's welfare at heart and a man who owes allegiance to no one. He has made no promises and is bound by nothing that will swerve him from his announced purpose of securing the best men available for the appointive offices. The socialists are not making a campaign. Their candidate for mayor, I am told, is filling lecture engagements in South Dakota. The issue is strictly between republican and democrat, and we only ask that every voter get out Monday and register his choice."

The polls will open at 8 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the evening. The polling places will be the same as in the primary election.

PATRIOTIC TALK BY NEW SENATOR

Hiram Johnson Says That Democratic Ideals Must Be Maintained.

Philadelphia, March 31.—Senator-elect Hiram W. Johnson of California, speaking at a patriotic demonstration here today, declared that the United States "will suffer much, even to the very tension of honor," before going to war, but that for the nation to refuse to maintain its "democratic ideals and protect its citizens would be to sow within itself the seeds of dissolution. "Democracy to survive must ever be ready to protect its own," he said. "Every normally constituted man abhors war. A nation such as ours consecrated to freedom, dedicated to equality among men, determined that all of God's people must share in God's blessings, that common folks may have their fair share of common happiness and a comfortable place in the world, will suffer much, even to the very tension of honor, before engaging in bloody strife. But a nation such as ours, dependent for its perpetuity upon the character of its citizenship, that dare not maintain its ideals and will not protect the lives of its citizens, sows within itself the seeds of dissolution. "We would have no selfish war of aggrandizement or aggression. We have no lust of conquest. We would, only when imperatively compelled by the transgression of our rights, by the destruction of our lives, enter the combat and then in the spirit of America, the spirit that took no indemnity from China and returned Cuba unto its own people."

WILL MARK TIME ON DEVELOPMENTS

Heads of State's Educational Institutions Defer Radical Changes.

Helena, March 31.—The conference of the heads of Montana's state educational institutions with Chancellor Elliott adjourned here this afternoon after deciding that until the war crisis takes a more definite turn the expansion program should be deferred and plans for graduating the senior classes in June should not be altered. The conference discussed a proposal to permit students who enlist in the national guard or who are members of the guard to continue their studies by correspondence, but no decision was reached on the subject. That another conference to dispose of these several problems will be called in the near future seems likely.

Heads of the State university, the State college, the State Normal school and the Montana School of Mines were represented at the conference with the chancellor. Necessities of the present situation did not appeal to the conferees as calling for radical steps with reference to hastening graduation, inauguration of a program of economy, provision for student soldiers or adoption of military tactics as a part of the curriculum of the state's schools.
