FIRST BUTTE BOY BECOMES PRIEST

J. Lowney to Be Ordained on April 11 and Say First Mass April 15.

Son of Mrs. Margaret Lowney of this city who will be ordained on April 11 at Sioux Falls, S. D., and say his first mass on April 15 at Sacred Heart, where he formerly served mass as an altar boy.

For the first time in the history of Butte, a native born Butte boy will be ordained to the priesthood when James Lowney, son of Mrs. W. E. Lowney of 814 West Copper street, will receive holy orders at Sioux Falls, S. D., on April 11. The ordination of Mr. Lowney will recall the memory of the famous Father Callaghan of the Sacred Heart parish, for it was he who recognized the ability of the young lad for the priesthood when he was a mere boy serving mass at the church and 12 years ago sent him to college. Father Lowney will celebrate his first mass at the Sacred Heart church on April 15 at 11 o'clock, officiating as celebrant where he formerly was an altar boy.

Mr. Lowney was born in Butte 26 1/2 years ago on East Quartz street. He graduated from the Sacred Heart parochial school and was sent by Father Callaghan direct from the eighth grade to St. Viator's college near Chicago. From there he went to the University of Chicago and later took a special course in the Catholic university of Washington, D. C. For the past two years he has been teaching at Columbus college, Chamberlain, S. D., and on his ordination will continue teaching in Catholic colleges. He will not be attached, however, to the Helena diocese. Father Lowney will be a member of the order known as the clerics of St. Viator, of which Father Clifford of this city and other Montana priests are alumni.

The Lowney family is well known in Butte, and the fact that to this family falls the honor of giving the first native born Butte boy to the church is one of sincere congratulation on the part of their friends and the clergy. There will be an elaborate ceremony at the Sacred Heart church on the occasion of his first mass, and a reception will be held after the mass, when Father Lowney will administer his blessing to the people. In addition to his mother there are three brothers, William, Joe and Denis Lowney, and a sister, Mrs. John Howe, living in Butte.
Within a short time another Butte boy will don the garb of priesthood. He is Peter M. Nigh, also an east side boy who studied at Mount St. Charles college in Helena and is now in Cincinnati completing his education. He was taken up by Father Venus six years ago and the pastor of the Sacred Heart church is anxiously awaiting the day when he can welcome "one of his own boys" into the church.
