

### DESERTION CAUSE OF TWO DECREES

**Alice Noble and Minnie Junkley Are Given Freedom. Other Cases.**

Judge Lynch heard two divorce matters this afternoon. He granted to Alice Noble a divorce from Silas Noble, Jr., on the ground of desertion. The couple were married at Lockport, N. Y., Jan. 30, 1913. The plaintiff was represented by Attorney M. Kerr Beadle. Minnie Junkley was given a divorce from Joseph Junkley on the ground of desertion. The couple were married in this city March 15, 1900. The plaintiff, in addition to the decree of divorce, was given permission to resume her maiden name, Minnie Young. Attorney G. L. Tyler appeared for the plaintiff. Florence Paquin is asking for a divorce from J. A. Paquin. The couple were married at Boulder July 7, 1915, and there is one child. In addition to the decree of divorce, the plaintiff is asking for \$30 a month alimony and an attorney fee of \$50. Nora Sanger today brought suit for divorce from Leslie Sanger on the

ground of cruelty. The couple were married in this city, Sept. 19, 1911, and there are two children. Upwards of a year ago the plaintiff brought suit for divorce, but there was a reconciliation and the defendant, the complaint says, promised to treat his wife better. In the complaint filed today, it is alleged that the defendant has threatened to kill his wife. The plaintiff asks for \$40 a month alimony and an attorney fee of \$50. Attorney M. Kerr Beadle represents the plaintiff.

### COUNTY TREASURER MAKES MARCH REPORT

The monthly report of County Treasurer John J. Harrington was filed with the county commissioners this afternoon. At the opening of the month of March the treasurer had on hand \$881,165.72. There was received during the past month \$37,755.88 from licenses, fees and other sources, and the expenditures amounted to \$193,677.48, leaving a balance on hand at the opening of the present month of \$755,243.88.

She first went to California and afterwards went to Philadelphia to make her home with a niece, Mrs. Huebner, formerly Miss Madeline Beal of this city. Miss Dinsmore was well known among the teachers of Montana. She was first taught in Butte in 1889. She was a graduate of Edinboro State Normal, Pa., and Valparaiso, Ind. She was very popular among the teachers and students and there is considerable sorrow in her death. Miss Dinsmore was about 59 years of age.
