**MURDER HALFBREED ON THE FLATHEAD**

Indian Agents Checking Evidence in Mysterious Case at Poison.

Federal Indian agents on the Flathead reservation are combing that section of the state to locate the murderer and to get evidence in the case of Joe Moss, a 19-year-old half-breed who was found dead in his bed in a tin four miles from Poison with a bullet hole in the back of his head, according to United States Marshal J. Ashbridge, who was here today on local business.

Marshal Ashbridge was an old friend of the murdered man and spent several days last fall hunting bear with him, who was a remarkable type of bear. He was 6 feet 2 inches tall, perfectly proportioned and widely known as a successful big game hunter and especially good at getting bears shot two more early this spring. He was known as a peaceful man and exceptionally good shot.

It appeared that Moss had secured a gun in Poison the night before his body was discovered. He was reported to have gone to the home of a native named Kramer and from there on horseback to his own place.

The next morning his little cousin brother, a boy of 9 or 10 years, made the gruesome discovery of the body. The bullet had entered the back of the skull and found an outlet through the mouth.

The affair was declared to be a suicide and evidence at the coroner's inquest pointed in that direction, but further evidence was secured which made such a procedure appear impossible, especially with the bullet hole in the back of the skull.

Every effort to locate the murderer being made by the federal agents in charge of the case. The motive for the murder is hard to determine. The Indians and breeds were under the influence of some of the "dread" whiskey which is secretly smuggled on the reservation at times.

**YOUNG MAN FOUND GUILTY OF LARCENY**

The jury yesterday afternoon found Harold McBride guilty of grand larceny, the punishment being left to the court. Judge Dwyer ordered the boy, who is less than 18 years of age, committed to the state industrial school until he attains the age of 21 years unless he is sooner paroled by the authorities. McBride, with Roy Ahmaly, was arrested for stealing two rifles from the Northern Pacific railroad depot. Ahmaly pleaded guilty when brought before the juvenile court, while McBride pleaded not guilty and demanded a jury trial. Ahmaly is in the state industrial school.

**DIRECTED VERDICT AGAINST METROPOLITAN LIFE INSURANCE CO.**

The Metropolitan Life Insurance company will have to pay Stephen Pearce \$445.34, adjudged to be due as commission for life insurance secured and which the company refused to pay. At the conclusion of the taking of testimony in the case yesterday afternoon Judge Lynch ordered a directed verdict for the amount named. The defendant asked for, and received, 30 days in addition to the time allowed by law in which to prepare and serve a bill of exceptions.

**DE VRY'S PET DEER WILL LURE ITS WILD BRETHREN TO CORRAL**

Rockford, Ill.—Deer from Lincoln park zoo, Chicago, will be employed to lure Ogle county's wandering herd into a corral which has just been constructed. Cy De Vry has loaned two deer for this purpose. The wild deer roam over the McCormick and other estates south of here and do considerable damage to crops. Farmers, nevertheless, try to protect them from hunters.

About 12 acres of land in the vicinity of the corral will be seeded to corn and alfalfa to provide food for the herd, which is believed to number about 40. Within the year Medill McCormick intends to enclose his entire estate with wire fencing 10 feet high, which will afford a practical deer park.

**SOY BEANS FINE AS HUMAN FOOD**

Introduced into United States More Than a Hundred Years Ago.

Washington, April 5.—Soy beans, introduced into the United States more than a hundred years ago primarily for use as a forage crop, are in reality one of the most nutritious of the legumes when used as human food, according to specialists of the United States department of agriculture. These beans have been used for centuries as a staple article of diet in China and Japan and are coming to be used more generally in this country as consumers learn their food value and palatability. Since they furnish protein, which contains nitrogen for muscle building, and valuable fat, they are especially important to turn to as an emergency addition to the usual dietary or as substitutes for other foods furnishing protein and fat. Moreover, the fact that they contain no starch makes them valuable for invalids who cannot eat starchy foods. These beans may be grown easily in practically all sections of the country where corn is grown and give heavier yields than most other beans.

Soy beans have been so important for other purposes that until recently they have attracted little attention for food purposes in this country. They are now coming into their own for that purpose, however, and the acreage of soy beans has increased steadily in recent years. The dried beans may be purchased now in a number of markets in various parts of the country, often under the name of togo beans, and should, with the increased acreage of the coming season, be more generally available. Soy bean meal, a by-product of oil making, is a valuable food and no doubt will come into more general use with the increased production of soy beans.

Where dried soy beans are available they may be baked with or without pork like navy and other beans. They should be soaked overnight and should be cooked longer than other kinds of beans. The cooking may be done economically in a fireless cooker of the sort provided with heating stones or plates; or on the ledge of the fire-box inside the furnace if the house happens to be heated with one of this type.

Dried soy beans have been canned in considerable quantities during the past season, baked with pork, and are on sale in this form in numerous markets. Canned green soy beans, which may be compared with lima beans, also are on the market in some sections of the country. Both these canned products yield as high a proportion of energy and a higher proportion of protein than the canned beans with which they are most closely comparable and so are more nourishing. Both are produced and handled usually at a lower cost than other beans and should, therefore, be obtainable at lower prices.
