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SOLEMN SERVICE IN THE CHURCHES

Holy Thursday Observed With Processions by Catholic Congregations.

Solemn high masses were celebrated in all local Catholic churches this morning in honor of Holy Thursday. Unusually large holy communion crowds are reported from each church. As today is the Anniversary of the institution of the blessed sacrament of the eucharist at the last supper, it is customary in the Catholic churches for as many as possible to attend holy communion on Holy Thursday. In some of the churches solemn processions, with flower girls and altar boys with lighted candles, were held. Following the procession there was adoration of the blessed sacrament, which will be exposed during the entire day.

This evening special Holy Thursday services will be held in the churches and the topic of the sermon will be the doctrine of transubstantiation. Tomorrow morning the Good Friday services will be held and again tomorrow evening there will be services. During tomorrow afternoon, especially at 3 o'clock, the members of the congregation will visit the churches and perform the stations of the cross. On Saturday morning services will also be held in the churches. Confessions will be held Saturday afternoon and evening, concluding the Lenten season with the Easter Sunday celebration.

The purple mourning will be taken from the altars and statues on Saturday night and the gay spring flowers will be used to decorate the altar for the Easter Sunday masses of the resurrection of the Savior. Added choirs will render the music and hundreds of candles will burn, testifying to the joy of Christendom that the Savior has risen.

DOUGLAS COMPANY TO PAY FIRST DIVIDEND

One Cent a Share is to Be Distributed to the Stockholders.

A Wallace newspaper contains the announcement of a dividend declared by the Douglas Mining company, made at a meeting of directors in that city on Monday.

"At a special directors' meeting of the Douglas Mining company held in Wallace last night, the officers authorized its first dividend of 1 per cent per share on the outstanding stock of the company of record to April 14, the dividend payable on May 1. The property is being operated under lease by the Anaconda Copper mining company which will continue to operate the property, though the bond for purchase was thrown up. Aside from hearing reports from officers of the company, the officers were directed to grant free right of way across the property of the company to any railroad projected to the district. It is stated that approximately 100,000 tons of ore are in sight on the property. Under the terms of the lease to the Anaconda company the Douglas receives a royalty of \$3 per ton for every ton shipped from the property. The company owns seven claims and three fractions located on Pine creek. F. F. Johnson of Boise is president, H. J. Rossi is vice president and Abe Wyman secretary and treasurer. The directors of the company, who attended the meeting are H. C. Adams, Henry Howes, J. W. Tabor, M. E. Fisher, Basil Hixson and A. J. Dunn. Capt. D. Gay Stivers of Butte, general counsel of the Anaconda company, attended the meeting."

Captain Stivers returned yesterday from Wallace. Some of the stock of the Douglas company is held by Butte investors.

BAIL FIXED AT \$7,500.

The bail of Gratton Moriarity, charged with robbery, has been fixed at \$7,500. This morning the name of Attorney W. G. Sullivan was ordered entered by Judge Dwyer as the defendant's representative. Moriarity will appear for arraignment Saturday morning.

LICENSE FEE IS EFFECTIVE TODAY

Law Now Requires \$2 From Prospective Bridegrooms for Necessary Papers.

Added to the high cost of living is the increased cost in getting married. At the last session of the legislature a law was passed providing for the payment of a fee of \$2 for each marriage license issued and this law went into effect today. Although those contemplating matrimony had ample warning that the law would go into effect April 5, few took advantage and got in on the "free list" during the last few days. Yesterday there were but three licenses issued, while on the day before only two were issued.

The charge of \$2 for a marriage license is not new in this state, but for several years the law provided that the clerks of the district court in the various counties should issue licenses without cost. The legislators several years ago thought it would be an incentive to young men to get married if the fee of \$2, which prevailed, was removed, and so the law was repealed and marriage licenses were declared as free as the air.

Several of the counties for the past few years have been protesting against the free marriage license law on the ground that it cost the county a considerable amount of money every year to provide clerks to issue licenses and to pay the printer to provide marriage registers and certificates. With the return to the law which prevailed for many years the counties will now be at least fully reimbursed for the outlay in this respect.

The first man to apply for a license under the new law had not made his appearance up to noon today.

MILK DEALERS ARE FINED BY WHITTY

Two Companies Found Guilty of Having Milk Short of Solids Required.

Judge P. J. Whitty this morning placed fines of \$100 each upon the Independent and Montana Dairy companies upon the city chemist's complaint that milk sold by the two concerns has been short in the total amount of solids required. Attorney Joseph Griffin for the defendants questioned the qualifications of City Chemist Harris, the latter proving to the satisfaction of the court that he is in every way qualified to make the tests. It was also charged by the defendants that the health department is "after" them.
