FEELING RUNNING HIGH IN THE EAST

Atlantic Seaboard One Mighty Wave of Patriotism, Visitor Says.

"In a mighty wave of patriotism and sentiment for America, the people of the Atlantic seaboard, rich and poor alike, great manufacturing concerns and little business men are joined in a common cause to aid the government of the United States in every way possible without thought of person, profit or position," Morris R. Hamilton said upon his arrival at the Thornton today. Mr. Hamilton is the western representative of the Standard Pressed Steel company, and said that his concern, along with the granite steel plants and other manufacturing concerns which will be of vital importance to the government of the United States in time of war, have practically turned over their plants to the government.

"Government orders will come first above all things and in every way, sacrificing great profits on other business, and outlining the government work to most prices is only one of the phases of patriotism which have swept over the Atlantic seaboard.

"You people in the west have not had the experience of foreign porters brought home. Many seafarers have lost relatives on the Louisiana and other vessels which were sunk. They have lost property by the big explosions in several munition plants and supply depots.

"They realize the trouble caused by the conspiracies and are aided by the activities of foreigners who have tried to break the unity of purpose of the government. On every hand they speak against Prussianism, not against the German people.

"The east is like a great muscle which is finally relaxed after many contractions and, once stirred up, will set calm down, but will use every effort to overcome the obstacles which which it is beset."

MONTANA ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Pinned Beneath a Cavein, Red Lodge Man Watches the Water Engulf Him.

Red Lodge, April 4.—Pinned under debris in a coal pit, Henry Rosetta, one of the officials of the International Coal company, was forced to remain for more than an hour watching water released from an irrigation ditch by the cavein creep in upon him. Powerless to move hand or foot, Rosetta would surely have been drowned were it not for the timely appearance of his son, who arrived just as the water touched his father's chin.

The accident happened Sunday Rosetta started after a supply of coal for use at his ranch, leaving instructions for his son to follow with a team. The son, believing he might be able to help his father, started earlier than he expected. He heard his father's cry for help as he neared the place, and by frantic digging released the prisoner in the nick of time.

Rosetta's hip was dislocated and he received other injuries. He will recover.

WANTS EXTRA SESSION.

Billings, April 4.—Senator T. S. Hogan yesterday proposed an extra session of the Montana legislature for the purpose of providing means for the planting of a large acreage in Montana during the coming year. He says the season is 30 days late and money, men and machinery will be needed. Indications now are that crops during 1917 will be 25 per cent short of normal.

MANY APPLICATIONS.

Bozeman, April 4.—The navy recruiting office here is being swamped with applications for enlistments by Bozeman's young men. More than 50 a day are applying for admission into the navy. Because of the rigid requirements only one-third of those who have applied to date have been accepted.

PATRIOTIC MEETING.

Missoula, April 4.—A big patriotic celebration is planned here for Easter Sunday afternoon. The Missoula Amusement company has donated the use of its building and the Missoula band will furnish the music without charge. The details of the celebration are being planned by the Chamber of Commerce.

FOR PURE FOOD.

Helena, April 4.—A vigorous campaign to enforce pure food laws in the state received stimulus yesterday when H. M. Shea, an expert from Bozeman, received an appointment as assistant to Dr. W. J. Ogden, secretary of the state board of health. Mr. Shea will make his headquarters in Helena.
