## DISCUSSING PLAN TO RAISE ARMIES

One Method Contemplates a Draft—What Montana's Share Might Be.

Washington, D. C., April 16.—Plans for putting into effect in Montana and the other states the draft that is to raise 1,000,000 men for an emergency army are being matured rapidly, despite the fact that conscription will not be resorted to the first thing. While the plan of selective conscription under which the general staff proposes to raise this army from the young men of the nation has not yet been approved by congress, it seems probable that any plan the administration puts forward will have the first approval of the law-making body and therefore the selective conscription, or forced draft plan, as the army men call it, may be regarded as almost a certainty.

The first increment of the emergency army has been estimated roughly at 500,000 men. It will be raised on a basis of population and an average of 1,800 men for each congressional district is the quota prescribed by the military experts as a basis of drafting for the army of 1,000,000. There are 455 congressional districts in the United States and an average of 1,800 per district would be a total of 782,000 men. Adding to this number the national guardsmen would bring up the total to around 1,000,000.

On this basis the war department has figured unofficially that Montana ought to raise 3,600 men to help to make up the first increment, or 1,800 per congressional district.

After the call comes registration places will be established all over Montana at which all men between the ages of 19 and 25 must appear and give information regarding themselves. Registration is compulsory and there is a heavy penalty attached to failure to register. The fact that a man may be exempted from service, under the law, does not permit him to fail to register if he is between the ages mentioned.

The exemptions are persons physically or morally unfit to serve; for persons having dependent relatives; for those whose services are needed by the government elsewhere and for those who have religious or conscientious scruples against war.

After all this is done, the government will first call the 25-year-old class to the colors. Then the 24-year-old class will be called; then the 23-year-old class and so on down, with the prospect that the 18, 20 and 21 year old classes will not be needed to fill up the first increment of 500,000 men.

When the first increment has been trained, however, the men who are now 19, 20 and 21 will be called to form another increment of 500,000 men. This may take a year, and possibly a year and a half.

It must not be understood that the 3,600 men that Montana must provide for the emergency army of 1,000,000 will be all the state is expected to provide. On the contrary, Montana ought to provide fully as many, if not more than this number, to fill up the regular army and the national guard.

The enlistment of men older than 25 is desirable for this purpose, army officers say, since the younger men will be called later anyway.

The idea of the government in calling for the 25-year-old class first is that this class will be much smaller than the younger ones. The older a man gets the more he is liable to exemption for dependencies, disabilities, etc.

In the next year the regular army, the present national guard and the emergency army will go through such training as never before seen on American soil. Rigorous training will be given daily in leaping trenches and bayoneting dummies; in running a bayonet through a small iron ring; in setting up barbed wire entanglements, building trenches, wearing gas masks, throwing bombs, machine gun exercises and also, in the case of many, the use of aeroplanes.

The present regular army, to almost all intents and purposes, is ignorant of modern warfare as the newest recruit and even the regular army will get its share of this training.

It is hardly conceivable, military experts say, that the United States will ever send an army to any other than the French front, and the training that the United States army will get will be based on that assumption.

## WARNING AGAINST PATRIOTIC GRAFTERS

Portland, Ore., April 16.—"Beware of patriotic grafters," was the warning issued here today by Adj. Gen. George A. White. "Numerous so-called patriotic societies are springing up which have no channels to follow because the field of activities they desire are already covered," he said. "Most of these movements are inspired by patriotic motives but some are viewed with suspicion and in their desire to help the nation's cause many people are liable to fall into the hands of political fakery, grafters and charlatans."



## GATES BRINGS SUIT AGAINST NEW CONCERN

In a suit brought by T. T. Gates, a rancher living near Whitehall, against the Consolidated companies, charges of a serious nature are made. The Consolidated companies is a \$3,000,000 corporation and Mr. Gates alleges in his complaint that through misrepresentation the representatives of the Consolidated companies induced him to turn over his stock in the National Life Insurance company in return for "convertible ownership debentures." Mr. Gates in the complaint asks that the court make an order declaring null and void the certificate showing that he purchased 102 convertible ownership debentures issued by the company. He also asks that the agreement made with the Consolidated companies on March 26 be canceled and set aside and that the Consolidated companies be compelled to restore to him his certificate for 100 shares of the capital stock of the National Life Insurance company. Mr. Gates asserts that although the Consolidated company is a three million dollar corporation only 25 shares of its capital stock have been subscribed and fully paid for.

## BROTHER OF JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER IS DEAD

Cleveland, April 16.—Frank Rockefeller, 72, youngest brother of John D. Rockefeller, died yesterday in his apartments in a hotel from a stroke of paralysis and a blood clot in the brain as a result of a relapse he sustained following an intestinal operation a month ago. He became seriously ill on Monday last and had been unconscious since Friday. He is survived by a widow and three daughters. The funeral will be held here on Tuesday.
