WILL REMEMBER THE FAMOUS RIDE

Butte Will Participate in National Celebration in Quiet Way Thursday.

Thursday, April 19, Patriots' day in all of the Butte schools, in theaters and other places, "the midnight ride of Paul Revere" will be remembered by the recitation and publishing of the famous national poem. Acting Mayor George Hageman issued a request this morning that the day be observed throughout the city and that stores, banks, schools, homes and every other building in the city be decorated with American flags.

It is probable the mayor will ask that all church bells in the city be tolled at midnight tomorrow and that whistles be sounded.

In New York the celebration will start at midnight tomorrow with the tolling of church bells. At the same time, overhead, the modern Paul Revere will fly over the city spreading the alarm. "The Enemy is Coming." At the same time a costume ball will be given in one of the leading hotels, at which the days of 1776 will be recalled in every detail.

On the morning of the 19th in New York the city will be awakened by the noise of big guns. Headquarters will be opened in Carnegie hall. A big parade will start at 1 o'clock.

"I would like to see the New York celebration duplicated here," said the acting mayor this morning. "As no special plans have been arranged, however, we can only depend upon the action of individuals. April 19 will be a day of patriotism throughout the country and Butte should do its best by a generous display of the colors."

ESCAPED MURDERER SLAIN BY ALASKA RANCHER

Juneau, Alaska, April 17.—The body of Edward Krause, the escaped murderer, who was shot dead at Doty's Cove Sunday by Arvid Fransen, a rancher, was buried in the pauper field yesterday. The coroner's jury exonerated Fransen and recommended that the governor's reward of \$1,000 for the capture or slaying of Krause be paid to the rancher. Krause had no weapon but a knife. He had rowed to the Cove in a stolen boat.

STOCKRAISERS MEET HAVE MANY PROBLEMS

In Session at Miles City This Week—Forest Grazing Question Up.

Conservation promises to be one of the most important of topics to be discussed in Miles City this week at the annual gathering of the Montana Stock Growers' association, according to several well-known cattle raisers of Montana who are here today while on a trip to the meeting.

"While the members have been advocating holding their calves and restricting the sale of veal, they will further emphasize that phase of the business at this meeting, it is believed," one of the visitors said.

"Another point which will be brought up and upon which action will be taken, it is expected, will be the matter of costs of leasing national forest reserves as grazing lands. The costs of these lands have gone up each year and at the same time other range land has been withdrawn, making the cattlemen's feed problem more intricate each season.

"It is believed that the association will take some steps to insure greater hay crops and to be better prepared for long winters."

GOOD JOBS READY FOR THE Y. M. C. A.

Mr. Colton Notified of Positions Waiting in Detroit, Mich.

There are many opportunities in Detroit, Mich., for young men who desire good positions, according to information received this morning by O. C. Colton, secretary of the Young Men's Christian association. The following letter was received this morning by Mr. Colton:

"Mr. O. C. Colton, General Secretary Y. M. C. A., Butte, Mont. "Dear Brother Secretary: Not knowing exactly what the industrial conditions might be in your community and feeling that there might be a bare possibility that you had young men in your city who were either unable to secure employment or wished to better their condition, I am taking the liberty of bringing to your attention the fact that there is an ever-increasing demand for young clerical men, stenographers, draftsmen and all kinds of mechanical men in our city. Especially is there a demand for young men who have had high school education and who are not too particular about the salary at which they start with but are more interested in where they are going to finish. For this class of young men there is a splendid opportunity. A young man who has confidence in himself is always desirable and would experience little or no difficulty in securing employment.

"Any young man coming to our city should be able to finance himself for 30 days, as it, possibly would be from two to three weeks before he could have a pay-day. CREDIT OF SCHOOL BOARD NOT GOOD

City Clerk Refuses Use of Auditorium Until Bill of \$630 is Paid.

While the papers are filled with the news of billion-dollar credits the school board was turned down this morning for a five-dollar "tick" account.

This morning one of the teachers in the junior high school applied for use of the Auditorium. Acting Mayor George Hageman said he would refer the matter to City Clerk A. A. Deck-stader.

"Nothing doing," said the city clerk. "The school board owes us \$630 and until that money is paid it will have no more credit here. The Auditorium was used as a school for weeks. I was told to come to the next meeting of the board and that the city would receive the rental. I was there—but the rental money wasn't.

"The junior high school may use the Auditorium when they please—after the school boards kicks through with the \$630 due and owing to the city."

Alderman Hageman, acting upon the information furnished him by the city clerk, refused to permit the Auditorium to be used by the junior high school.
