The members of the order will meet at the Ellis' hall at 8:15 o'clock and proceed to St. Joseph's church, where a solemn high mass will be celebrated at 9 o'clock, to be followed by a sermon by the Rev. Father Duffy, a member of the Oblate order now conducting a mission at St. Joseph's church. After the church service the members of the order will assemble at Stevens & Main hall, where the ladies of the parish will entertain the members at breakfast. The music at the mass will be furnished by the Knights of Columbus choir.

### TESTIMONY TAKEN IN HOLDUP CASE

C. Reese Identified as One of Men Who Held Up Greyhound Saloon.

Charles Reese, charged with being one of the persons who planned and held up the Greyhound saloon on the night of March 26 last, is on trial before Judge Dwyer and a jury today. Reese is also charged with a prior conviction, having pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary and served a term in Deer Lodge. Alleged to have been associated with Reese in the planning and holdup of the saloon were Albert Haurbrich, Reuben Edstrom, Vernie A. Yeager and Mabel Yeager. The parties demanded separate trials and Reese is the first of the party to go to trial.

As to Mabel Yeager, the wife of Vernie A. Yeager, the information has been dismissed, as she is under 18 years of age, and if prosecuted it will be under the juvenile act. The state is represented in the prosecution by County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, Chief Deputy N. A. Rotering and Deputy Frank L. Riley, while the defendant is represented by Attorneys Earl Blodgett and J. E. Emlich.

The jury selected to try the case is composed of Thomas J. Hour, Nicholas Stiren, Cain Connors, David Gennara, Ed Dunleavy, John Richards, John L. Peterson, Michael Sullivan, C. H. Wolfe, William Barth, Fred McClean and Fred Cobb.

Deputy County Attorney Frank L. Riley, in making the opening statement in behalf of the state, said that evidence would be produced to show that the defendant, along with two others, entered the saloon on the night of March 26 last and there held up at the point of guns the persons who were in the place. He said that William Potter was robbed of \$18 and others of like amounts.

Mrs. Arthur J. Wade, owner of the Greyhound saloon, told of being informed of the holdup of the saloon and to the fact that the money taken from the cash register belonged to her.

William Potter said that the three holdup men entered the saloon at about 11:30 o'clock on the night of March 26 and each of the men had guns. The men directed the people about the place to throw up their hands and every one obeyed. The tall man had the long gun.

Charles Osborn and Louis Olsen told of the three men entering the saloon and displaying guns. They could not identify Reese.

**Identify Reese.**

Homer J. Edwards said that he was in the Greyhound saloon when the three men entered, holding guns in their hands. He positively identified Reese as one of the men and declared that Reese was the man who gave the order for every one to throw up his hands. Edwards said that he was not searched.

When court resumed this afternoon Nicholas Thomas was called as the first witness. He said that he was in the Greyhound saloon on the night of the holdup. There were three men in the party.

"Do you recognize anyone in the courtroom as one of the holdup men?" the witness was asked.

"Yes, there is one of the men," replied the witness, pointing to Reese. "He struck a gun in my ribs."

Fred Yelan said that he was also in the Greyhound saloon and he said that he positively identified Reese as the man who went through his pockets and took two nickels from him. Reese had a gun in his hand, the witness said.

John J. Herd was a bartender on the afternoon shift at the Greyhound saloon. The witness said he recognized Reese as the man who struck a gun in front of him and told him to get from behind the bar.

### SHOW RESULTS OF OIL FLOTATION AT MAGMA

Testimony at Trial of Patent Suit is Largely Corroborative.

More testimony in support of the claim that use of oil in quantities prescribed by processes which antedate the Minerals Separation company's patented oil flotation process in big oil flotation plants of the west are producing better recoveries of metal content from complex ores than the quantities (less than 1 per cent) prescribed by the Minerals Separation patent is being introduced in the federal court today by the Butte and Superior Mining company in defense of the infringement suit which the Minerals Separation company has instituted against it.

Much of today's testimony is intended to corroborate that heretofore given with respect to adaptability of old patented and published processes to reduction of ore on a commercial basis. Ralph A. Conrads, who is in charge of the Utah Copper company's Magma mill, described in detail the results from use of varying amounts of oil, both under and over 1 per cent. Recoveries, he said, were greater when more than 1 per cent was used.

It is probable that the defense this evening will ask for an adjournment of the trial over Monday to give opportunity of arranging presentation of its case in a manner which will expedite the trial.

The miniature oil flotation plant being erected at the federal building to visualize results of use of varying amounts of oil will not be placed in operation until the middle of next week.

### WILSON EXPLAINS THE ARMY SYSTEM

Selective Conscription Plan is the Subject of Letter to Congressman.

Washington, April 20.—President Wilson today sent a letter to Representative Helvering of Kansas, explaining and strongly supporting the administration's army bill with its selective conscription plan. The letter indicated the purpose of the administration to insist upon enactment of the measure vigorously.

The letter follows:

"I welcome the inquiry of your letter of April 19, because I have realized the truth of what you say from my own observations, namely that what is meant to be understood by the selective draft is not generally understood throughout the country.

"The process of the draft is, I think, very clearly set forth in the bill drafted by the war department and which I so earnestly hope the congress will adopt, but it is worth while to state the idea which underlies the bill a little more fully.

**Not the Most Important.**

"I took occasion the other day in an address to the people of the country to point out the many forms of patriotic service that were open to them and to emphasize the fact that the military part of the service was by no means the only part, and perhaps, all things considered, not the most vital part. Our object is a mobilization of all the productive and active forces of the nation and their development to the highest possible point of co-operation and efficiency and the idea of the selective draft is that those should be chosen for service in the army who can be most readily spared from the prosecution of the other activities which the country must engage in and to which it must devote a great deal of its best energies and capacity.

**Volunteer System's Failing.**

"The volunteer system does not do this. When men choose themselves they sometimes choose without due regard to their other responsibilities. Men may come from the farms or from the mines or from the factories or centers of business, who ought not to come, but ought to stand back of the armies in the fields and see that they get everything that they need and that the people of the country are sustained in the meantime.

**Selective Draft Principle.**

"The principle of the selective draft, in short, has at its heart this idea, that there is a universal obligation to serve and that a public authority should choose those upon whom the obligation of military service shall rest and also in a sense choose those who shall do the rest of the nation's work. The bill, if adopted, will do more, I believe, than any other single instrumentality to create the impression of universal service in the army and out of it, and if properly administered will be a great source of stimulation.

"Those who feel that we are turning away altogether from the volunteer principle seem to forget that some 600,000 men will be needed to fill the ranks of the regular army and the national guard and that a very great field of individual enthusiasm lies there wide open."



### LAD ABANDONED BY PARENTS IN COURT

Three Boys Are Before Dwyer. Two Are Allowed to Go With Warning.

There were three boys before Judge Dwyer this morning, two of them charged with truancy and the third with roaming about without any permanent place of abode. The two boys charged with truancy were allowed to go home with their parents with the warning that failure to attend school in the future would be followed by a term in the industrial school.

The boy who was without a home is 16 years of age and of bright and intelligent appearance. In reply to questions propounded by the judge, the lad said that he had been abandoned by his parents, who were divorced. The lad said that he came here a few days ago from Salt Lake, beating his way on the Oregon Short Line. He was picked up by the officers and taken to the industrial school.

"This is a case which requires attention," said the judge, "and is another evidence of the laxity of the divorce law wherein no provision is made for the care of children."

Judge Dwyer sent for Deputy Humane Officer P. J. Gilligan, and before noon Mr. Gilligan had arranged for the boy to go to a good home out in the country, where he would get board and room \$20 a month and an opportunity to go to school at least part of every day.

### PRAYER SERVICE IN LONDON FOR AMERICA

been solemnized was unprecedented in being the commemoration of an act of another nation.

Overhead in the dim arches hung the dust-weighted and battle-torn flags of famous British regiments, some of which had been carried in the American war of the revolution, while among the tombs and memorials of famous soldiers ranged about the walls were the names of those who fought against the colonies in that war.

**Cathedral Crowded.**

The cathedral seats nearly 4,000 people and was filled to its capacity. All seats were occupied when King George and Queen Mary entered, followed by the mayors and aldermen of the 25 boroughs of London wearing their scarlet robes of office.

The American embassy and consular staffs occupied front seats with representatives of the Pilgrims, the American society, American Luncheon club and the American Chamber of Commerce. In diplomatic section were officers in the uniforms of France, Russia, Italy, Belgium, Serbia, Montenegro, Rumania and Japan.

Throughout the cathedral the army khaki and the navy blue were conspicuous. In the reserved seats there were a large number of wounded officers and soldiers, including many Canadians and several Americans serving with the Dominion forces. Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law represented the cabinet in the absence of Premier Lloyd George.

### The Service.

The king and queen and Princess Mary were received at the entrance by the lord mayor and sheriff, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's and United States Ambassador Page. The congregation rose while their majesties walked down the center aisle and remained standing until the royal party was seated. Then the hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past, Our Strength Through Years to Come," was sung in a deep and mighty chorus with a heavy roll of drums from a band of the Welsh guards. The service which followed consisted of the Lord's Prayer, Psalms XLVI and XLIV, lessons from Isaiah LXXI, the Apostles' Creed, a prayer, the Battle Hymn of the Republic, a sermon by Bishop Brent; the hymn, "Through the Night of Doubt and Sorrow"; benediction by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" and "God Save the King."

The clergy of St. Paul's conducted the service assisted by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London. The text from which Bishop Brent spoke was chosen from Macrae and bees, second chapter, thirteenth verse, "Having gone apart from the elders, he resolved that they should go forth and try the matter in fight, by the help of God. And committing the decision to the Lord of the World, and exhorting them that were with him to contend manfully, even unto death, for the laws, the temple, the city, the country and the commonwealth, he pitched his camp—having given out to his men the watchword, 'Victory is God's.'"

### Crowds Cheer the King.

It is impossible for all the congregation to hear the words of a preacher in St. Paul's, but the prayers and psalms were read by the whole assemblage and the hymns, sung by thousands of voices reinforced by the choir, the great organ, trumpets and drums, were deeply moving and unforgettable. The ritual was worthy of a momentous event in history and the temple of a nation. The royal party came from Windsor for the service and drove to the cathedral in open carriages drawn by four horses, with out-riders but no military escorts. The king returned to Buckingham palace afterward, the crowds along the route cheering him heartily.
