GODFREY KICKED AFTER STABBING

Witnesses Claim Man Was Attacked—Autopsy Reveals a Big Bruise.


Reports circulated that Harry Godfrey was kicked while he lay dying on the sidewalk in front of the Exchange saloon on North Main street yesterday, after being cut by James Shea, were verified to a certain extent by the autopsy performed by Dr. H. A. Maillet on the body. A big bruise was found on the man's side. "He was evidently kicked after being stabbed," said Dr. Maillet. "The reports of witnesses show that at no time was Godfrey on the floor until after he was stabbed and had staggered to the sidewalk. The kick could not have been administered while he was standing. He was kicked while he was lying down."

Several witnesses have volunteered information that Godfrey was attacked when he tried to arise from the sidewalk. Shea, at the time, was being held in the saloon for the arrival of officers. M. M. Sullivan, proprietor of the saloon, today denied that he told Shea if he didn't keep his mouth shut witnesses "would tell a few things they knew." Sullivan says when Shea tried to lay the blame upon someone else that he became angry and told Shea if he didn't shut up someone would probably say something that was not true. Sullivan also made the statement that Godfrey had repeatedly insulted the American government in his saloon. "The other day he said he hoped Germany would sink every American ship," said Sullivan. "I started to hit him but thought it best to keep out of trouble."

In a statement made last night Shea declared he stabbed in self-defense. He claimed that Godfrey attacked him with a knife and that he took the knife away from him and then struck out. At least three witnesses told the county attorney that Shea took the knife out of his own pocket and that the deceased had nothing whatever in his hands. Coroner Lane declared this morning that the inquest will be held about next Thursday. The autopsy revealed a deep cut over the collar bone which severed the jugular vein. The slash in Godfrey's back was deep and about 18 inches in length. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made. Abundant Health is assured when there is good blood in the veins. 
