BROWNE RANCH SOLD

Dillon, April 26.—A deal was closed yesterday in which the Woods Livestock company purchased the ranch of Joe Browne on Rock creek for \$20,000. There are 480 acres in the place, and it will be used to run sheep by the Woods company. The deal was made by Frank Hazelbaker.

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The boats on the Flathead lake began this week to make their regular runs between Somers and Polson, the ice having been broken in the bay at Somers sufficiently to allow their passage.

A new jewelry store has been opened at Sheridan. The town is also to have a modern blacksmith shop, a new building being erected for that purpose.

Located at the very northeast corner of the Fort Peck reservation is found the little village of Reserve, which is rapidly developing as an important trading point for farmers. While the village proper may not have a population at the present time of over 100 people the town has been steadily growing ever since the government held a town lot sale less than two years ago.

Contracts have been awarded for the construction of another modern apartment house at Great Falls. The building will be of colonial design and cost approximately \$21,000. It will be known as the Scharrer apartments.

A townsite has been laid out at Rexford. A large saw mill will be built at the place and there is a chance of the town being made a freight terminal.

A Moose lodge has been organized at Conrad. There were 80 charter members.

At the annual clean-up at Libby all the business houses closed and the business men, clerks and residents spent the day in an effort to beautify the town.
