

PUTS IDEA UP TO THE GOVERNMENT

P. J. Kelly Suggests the Use of Traveling Men as Agents of Uncle Sam.

P. J. Kelly, sales manager in the northwest for the Lincoln Paint and Color company, who is in the city today on a business trip, has submitted a plan to the government whereby the army of commercial travelers might be employed in the United States service. Mr. Kelly recently put the plan before Congressman Addison T. Smith of Twin Falls, Ida., who suggested that he also take it up with Senator T. J. Walsh of Montana. Mr. Kelly has written a letter to the senior Montana senator in which he said in part:

"In the United States there are about 500,000 traveling men. About 350,000 of these are a pretty brilliant class of people. They are all graduates of one of the greatest colleges in the world, the college of hard experience, and the most of them have had to make their own way in the world. Men who are graduates of a school like this are quick to think and quick to act. I think it would be a good idea to see if this great body of intelligent men could not be used as an auxiliary to the secret service of the United States, or they could be made the same as the state militia is to the United States army.

"We are traveling on every kind of conveyance that carries passengers. We are also in hotels at all times, and if this great body of men could be used as secret service men, they could give you a great deal of valuable information of what is going on. They could also have authority to make arrests if necessary and turn the persons arrested over to the nearest sheriff or United States marshal.

"This would have to be taken up through the different traveling men's organizations, and if taken up in an intelligent way we could have 500,000 secret service men working in 30 days."

Mr. Kelly said today that the traveling men would gladly act without compensation, if they could be of service to the government. He had been told that the government had to pay anyone in its employ, but in the case of this proposed auxiliary force the compensation could be nominal—just enough to make it legal and no more. He thought \$1 a month would carry out the idea.

Mr. Kelly travels about 50,000 miles a year. He formerly lived in Helena, where he still has interests, and he has made Butte about as often as any commercial traveler on the road.

SHIPS THE GREAT NEED OF ALLIES

Conferences at Washington Bring Out Critical Situation in Europe.

Washington, April 27.—Conferences between France's war commission to the United States and American officials on the part this country will play in the war against German autocracy today were well under way.

Conferences begun yesterday will be continued today and it is believed the commission will have concluded its business with the United States government before the middle of next week.

Plans may then be definitely made for its members to visit historic points, including Valley Forge, and several cities, including Philadelphia, New York, Boston and Chicago.

The British war commissioners had nothing before them today but the discussion with American officials of details of the immediate program of the United States participation in the war and the next 10 days should see the complete drawing up of plans as to America's part in the conflict.

Ships increasingly appear as a great necessity in the war. It is evident that the German submarine campaign has created a critical situation in France and Italy and also in England, which acts as the relay and supply point for her allies.
