

CONNERY KILLED BY DUNN SLAYER

Captain of Minnesota Guard Notified of Officer's Body.

Minneapolis, May 7.—With the discovery in the woods near Fridley, Minn., of the body of Patrolman George Connery of St. Paul, the police of this city and St. Paul have arrived at the theory that the slayer of Connery and of Mrs. Alice Dunn, who was well known in eastern Montana, is the same person.

The police departments of the two cities are co-operating in unraveling the strange case and much evidence has been secured in connection with both cases and especially in the Connery case.

Connery's body was found Saturday in an isolated spot near Fridley, following a mysterious telephone call to a national guard captain on duty near the place. While Connery was dying from two bullet wounds, one in the thigh and one in the abdomen, and from a fracture of the skull, he remained conscious, wrote a farewell note to his wife and children and another which the police have withheld and is believed to have given a description of his murderer.

He tried to staunch his wounds with a handkerchief and torn piece of his trousers. His head had been crushed from heavy blows of a blunt instrument.

The police believe that the same gun was used in both killings, and today will determine the caliber of the bullets by a scientific investigation.

MANY OBJECTIONS TO GOVERNMENT CONTROL

British Official Talks of Operations of Railways in Many Countries.

Washington, May 7.—Political control in a democracy is one of the evils that make government ownership of railways of dubious value. W. M. Acworth of the British commission which recently investigated Canadian roads today told the joint congressional committee investigating transportation problems in the United States. He said government ownership was unsuccessful in most countries that tried it.

"It is impossible," said Mr. Acworth, "to obtain satisfactory results on government railways in a democratic state unless the management is out loose from direct political control. Neither Australia nor any other country with a democratic constitution—perhaps an exception ought to be made of Switzerland—has succeeded in maintaining a permanent severance. In France, Belgium and Italy interference has never been abandoned for a moment. The facts show that parliamentary interference has meant running the railways not for the benefit of the people at large, but to satisfy local and sectional or even personal interests. They show further that under parliamentary management it is easier to get money for big schemes of new construction than for inconspicuous day to day betterments and improvements which probably could produce much greater public benefit." Mr. Acworth said some day the people might decide to constitute a

branch of government to run the railways which would not be subject to popular interference and be independent of parliamentary control. Such a board, he said, might remove many existing objections to government roads.

JANITOR'S WIFE GETS DIVORCE AND ALIMONY
