

FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL

Mayor Holland of Walkerville Will Make His Appointments Tonight.

Walkerville, known throughout the length and breadth of the land as the only city in the United States out of debt, has passed its twenty-seventh milestone. It was incorporated in 1890. Tonight the new city council takes charge of the city's affairs under most auspicious conditions. There is a balance of \$3,000 in the treasury with several thousand dollars more to come in and not a debt to be paid.

The man at the helm of the Hill city at the present time is John C. Holland, democrat, a shrewd business man and whose progressive policies have done much to beautify the city. At tonight's meeting of the council he will outline his policies for the coming year and appoint the various committees. Mr. Holland was elected mayor a year ago, after having served as city clerk and also later as alderman from the second ward.

The council, as made up for the coming year, will be as follows: First ward, Thomas and Frank Dent, both republicans; Second ward, W. T. Davis and Ed Matthews, both democrats; Third ward, Mike Bolton and Grant Robinson, both democrats. The holdovers are Thomas and Bolton. Matthews was re-elected. Dent was elected to succeed Joe Briney and Davis was chosen to fill the unexpired term of the late Jeff McNamees. William Matthews is city clerk, Fred O'Donnell marshal and Milson O'Neill night marshal.

The most important committees to be appointed at tonight's session are the street and alley, fire and water and lights. Mayor Holland stated this morning that he had decided upon the appointments but would not announce them until the council meets tonight.

Yesterday the mayor, accompanied by all the councilmen, made a tour of the city. An inspection was made of the condition of the streets and alleys and of the lighting system. The sewers were also made a part of the tour and notes taken where improvements should be made.

A year ago, with the advent of Mr. Holland into office, a cleanup and improvement campaign commenced that resulted in a changed appearance of the city on the hill. Streets and alleys were graded and new sewers added during the twelve-month. A system was devised for handling the refuse. The city purchased a truck and the residents were compelled to purchase garbage cans. The city makes regular trips in clearing away the collections. These policies, it is understood, will be followed out this year. The workings of the council with the mayor have been most harmonious during the past and there is every indication that same feeling of harmony will dominate the meetings of the new city council.

FRENCH ENVOYS AT ST. LOUIS

French Society Presents Viviani and Joffre With Medals of Honor.

St. Louis, May 7.—The demonstrative welcome accorded former Premier Viviani, Marshal Joffre and other members of the French war mission at the St. Louis Coliseum last night was outstanding today when the visitors took part in a parade across the city.

Many remembered that this was the second anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania and regarded the ovation accorded the French visitors a fitting memorial to the victims of the first great submarine outrage.

The parade was preceded by a breakfast attended by 700 persons, during which medals of honor were presented to M. Viviani and Marshal Joffre on behalf of the French society of St. Louis. M. Viviani was much affected and kissed the spokesman of the society on the cheek.

Two toasts were drunk in water—one to the president of the United States and one to the president of France.

Mayor Kiel of St. Louis, who was to have delivered a welcoming address at the breakfast, was unable to be present because of illness, but he appeared later, rode in the first automobile with M. Viviani and Marshal Joffre during the parade.

TO VISIT LINCOLN'S TOMB

Springfield, Ill., May 7.—Hundreds of Springfield business houses and residences are flying French and American flags today and the city is full of soldiers in readiness to receive General Joffre and other members of the French mission this afternoon.

After a visit to Lincoln's tomb in Oak Ridge cemetery, the members of the commission will be conveyed to the state house, where they will be received by the house and senate in joint session.

MORE AMBULANCE MEN SOUGHT FOR FRANCE

Call is Made for Young Americans to Help in the Great Work.

In furthering the appeal of France for more men in the American ambulance corps abroad, moving pictures of the work will be exhibited in Butte May 28. C. W. Goodale has received an appeal for more men from the officers of an American organization which has been formed with the view of increasing the service and establishing it. Efforts to get more men to help in this work will be taken up by the Rotary club and other organizations.

The service is composed almost entirely of young Americans, nearly all of them college men who have volunteered for the work and are paying their own expenses. There are 200 ambulances and 400 men in the service, and those adding the cause are anxious to have 500 cars in the field. Efforts are also being made to raise \$200,000 a year which is required to operate the corps.


