FIELD STREWN WITH DEAD AFTER COUNTER ATTACKS

Paris, May 9.—The French last night captured first line German trenches over a front of three-quarters of a mile northeast of Chevreux, near Craonne, the war office announced.
The French took 150 prisoners. During the night the Germans made repeated counter attacks in force against the important positions taken from them in the plateau of Chemin-Der-Dames and on the Californie plateau. Although the Germans were stopped by French artillery and machine gun fire, new assaulting waves resumed the effort several times until the ground was strewn with German dead.

RUSSIANS ADVANCE ON THE RUMANIAN FRONT

Petrograd, May 9 (via London).—Russian troops on the Rumanian front northwest of Senie yesterday broke through the Teuton positions and advanced towards Jenawer, says an official statement issued today.

ALLIED TROOPS DEFEATED DECLARES BERLIN

Berlin, May 9 (via London).—German and Bulgarian troops have administered a severe defeat upon entente forces in Macedonia, army headquarters announced today.

HINDENBURG AGAIN PREDICTS A VICTORY

Amsterdam, May 9 (via London).—Field Marshal von Hindenburg is again predicting victory, according to the Berlin Tageblatt. This paper quotes the field marshal as saying in reply to an address from the Saxon second chamber:
"The soldier spirit, which is always cultivated by the all-highest war lord, has again proved its strength. If the home army also holds on, then we are certain of victory."

GERMANS HOLDING FAST TO FRESNOY

Berlin, May 9 (via London).—Fresnoy, on the Arras battle front, has been held by the Germans against the French and British attacks. An additional 100 prisoners have been captured, says today's army headquarters statement.

LOSSES ON ARRAS LINE SMALLER THAN AT SOMME

London, May 9.—Andrew Bonar Law, member of the British war council, today stated in the house of commons that the British losses in the recent offensive on the Arras front in France were from 50 to 75 per cent fewer than those in the battle of the Somme.

DR. GROSVENOR TELLS SECRETS OF PROCESS

Only Witness on Stand in Patent Controversy in Federal Court.

Dr. William Mason Grosvenor of New York continued to give testimony today in the methods of oil flotation in the suit now on trial in the federal court here between the Minerals Separation Company of London and the Butte and Superior in the patent controversy. He finished the direct-examination this morning and the cross-examination was started this afternoon. He gave a lengthy and highly technical discourse, going into the various phases of the process in minute detail.

NO LIQUOR AT YALE REUNIONS

Ex-President Taft Urges That No Booze Be Bought With the Class Funds.

Many reunion and graduating classes of Yale have decided that no liquor will be paid for out of class funds and the serving of liquor at reunion headquarters next month will be probably dispensed with altogether, according to advices received by Rev. Lawrence A. Wilson, pastor of the Community church, who graduated in 1909 from the Yale School of Religion.
Former President William H. Taft, chairman of the "committee of 71," in a letter to the alumni asks members for an opinion on the subject and calls attention to the statement of David Lloyd George, which is printed on the letter head and says: "We are fighting three enemies, Germany, Austria and Drink." The former president's letter says:
"Our country has entered the war with all her resources. It is time to profit by the successes and mistakes of her allies. They have all found that to gain national efficiency, which requires physical, mental and moral fitness, drinking must be curtailed."
"Several reunion classes and the two graduating classes have decided that no liquor will be paid for out of class funds. This is a fair, patriotic and sensible move."
"Captain Danford, who has done more than anyone else for Yale preparedness, says: 'This is a great movement and deserves the intelligent, thoughtful support of every patriotic Yale man.'"

The corporation on April 17 last voted to recommend to class committees that the serving of liquor be dispensed with.

UNRULY PRISONERS QUITE DOCILE NOW

Statement That O'Neill Has a Bible Makes the County Officers Smile.

That John O'Neill and Frank Fisher, the two highwaymen condemned to death for the murder of Thomas Higgins, have suddenly been converted from the lowest, most profane and unruly prisoners in the Silver Bow county jail to docile paragons of virtue, who in long-distance, sob-sister interviews are quoted as making vigorous protestations of innocence, finding consolation in the Bible and representing to dotting parents that they have enlisted in the navy, strikes county officials, who have stood their filthy abuse, both before and since they were condemned, as being immeasurably funny.
"Ever since we have had them over there, these fellows have been abusive. They have spat at the jailers, and in the case of O'Neill at the death watch, using the vilest language they could lay tongue to," said Undersheriff Melia today. "Such profanity and vile abuse I have never heard before, and as for finding solace in a Bible, why they have never had one in their cells."
Discussing an interview just published, the undersheriff declared that but one newspaper man visited the prisoners yesterday, and he represents a weekly publication. This particular writer and the men's attorney were the only ones who saw them during the day.
Whether or not O'Neill's relatives are in ignorance of his plight may be judged by the fact that they have furnished funds for his defense, and that postponement of the time for sentence from week to week was in anticipation that they would come to his aid. Although he is accredited with a letter to his mother signed "Jackie," O'Neill's real name is Roy Gullich.
County Attorney Jackson said that he was prepared to resist a movement for commutation of sentence and anticipated that a play for public sympathy would be made.
Arrangements for the execution are going forward at the sheriff's office. The old gallows on which 20 men have already been hanged has been ordered forwarded to Butte from Deer Lodge, where it was last used.

which serves as the motive power of the truck. None of the normal city water pressure is lost in the pumping operation, for the intake is direct from the fire plug. It pumps the water to a height of 116 feet at the rate of 350 gallons per minute.
During the test buildings nearly a block distant from the station were reached by the stream.
The "booster" pump is as efficient as the old-time fire engine. It is said by authorities. Water may be pumped from a stream or a well with it.
