FRESHETS ARE WORKING HAVOC WITH THE ROADS

Commissioners on an Inspection Tour and Order Repairs.

The county commissioners spent Saturday afternoon and yesterday inspecting roads and bridges in different sections of the county. Saturday afternoon the Second street bridge was examined and afterwards the commissioners went to a point a short distance beyond the Miss Mile, where some 400 feet of road had been washed out by the heavy freshets. A large crew of men, working for several days, had the road practically restored and it was found to be open for traffic again.

Yesterday the commissioners first went out to Hall Columbia gulch, where the heavy freshets had washed out a couple of small bridges and portions of the road at different points. The water was still rushing over the road at points, but a force of men digging drains to carry off the water was gradually getting the road in shape again. Next the Brown's gulch's road, where the freshet had washed small portions of the road, was visited and arrangements made with Joe Martini to put a force of men at work to make the necessary repairs.

After inspecting the Second street bridge Saturday the commissioners drove to the county poor farm, where it was found good progress was being made in preparing some ten acres of ground with which to grow vegetables.

TWO DIVORCES GRANTED ON GROUND OF CRUELTY

Grace L. Corporon Gets Decree After Seven Years of Married Life.

Judge Lynch today granted a divorce to Grace L. Corporon from C. J. Corporon on the ground of extreme cruelty. The couple were married in July, 1910. The plaintiff, who was represented by Attorney George D. Toole, said that she left her husband last October as she could not longer live with him on account of the treatment she received. She said that he beat and kicked her and on one occasion was confined to her bed for three days as a result of the beating.

Nasta Tonko was given a divorce from Mike Tonko on the ground of cruelty. The plaintiff was represented by Attorney Lyman J. Rosow, and she informed the court in reply to questions that her husband beat her with his fists and made it impossible for her to live with him.

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR J. H. CHOATE IN LONDON

The Archbishop of Canterbury Praises His Effort to Cement Two Nations.

London, May 21.—Several hundred persons attended a service in memory of Joseph H. Choate of New York at St. Margaret's church, Westminster, today. The Archbishop of Canterbury spoke of Mr. Choate's services for the American and British nations. Among those at the service were Ambassador Page, Mrs. Page, Robert P. Skinner, the American consul general; Mrs. Skinner, Mrs. Whitlaw Reid, former Premier Asquith, Viscount Bryce, Lord Beresford, the Marquis of Lansdowne, Lady Randolph Churchill and Sir Thomas Lipton, Lady Gilbert Parker and Sir Robert B. Finlay, lord high chancellor. In his address the Archbishop of Canterbury said:

"Mr. Choate was a pre-eminently great American citizen, a conspicuous example of what is pure and without reproach in the public life of a great country. And as he stood for what is best in American life, he stood not less strenuously for what cemented in bonds of heartfelt friendship the American and British people, both of whom he had served so well. The pure flame of what is straight-forward in purpose and high-minded in endeavor burned brightly. By God's help we are not going to let it flicker or wane."

Another memorial service was held in Temple church, attended by Judges and lawyers.
