MONTANA TO RAISE FUND OF \$20,000 TO AID THE SOLDIERS

Montana will raise a fund of \$20,000 for the purpose of taking care of the United States soldiers at the front, it was announced following a conference at Helena last Friday. The state will be divided into districts and officers named for each district. The local district will be officered by Chairman Malcolm Gillis, Secretary O. C. Colton and Treasurer J. R. Wharton, and it is proposed to raise \$5,000 as Butte's share. The Missoula Chamber of Commerce has guaranteed \$1,500. The state organization is now sending out letter heads for the campaign, and already several in Butte have promised donations of \$100 each.

100 CONVICTS AT WORK ON BIG HOLE RIVER ROAD

George R. Metlen, chairman of the state highway board and member of the state highway commission, yesterday made a visit of inspection to Beaverhead county, where, at a point on the Big Hole river road, near the power dam, 100 convicts are at work widening the road. This work is being done jointly by the highway commission and Beaverhead county. It is stated that nearly \$2,000,000 a year is being expended on the highways of the state, and it will be the object of the highway commission to secure as much uniformity in the work as possible.

GERMANS HAVE BIG INTERESTS IN U. S.

Subjects of Kaiser Hold Billions of American Securities.

New York, May 21.—Billions of dollars in property, manufactures and other investments in the United States are held by Germans who live here and in Europe, but there is almost no American investment in Germany.

Sir George Paish, English economist, places German investment in American corporations alone at about \$1,000,000,000. Dividends and interest on a large part of these securities have been collected by American banks and held here, to be sent to Germany when peace comes.

German insurance companies, whose risks here amount to \$3,500,000,000, must have a heavy investment here to carry this insurance. The whips worth \$148,000,000 just seized by this country represent another tremendous investment.

German subjects in the United States also own large quantities of goods from their mother country, now held in warehouses. Germany has bought American products for use after the war, but still hold here, and large holdings of American property belong to German immigrants who have not yet been naturalized.

SELECTING OFFICERS FOR GENERAL STAFF

Fifty Majors and Captains to Be Added to Strategy Board.

Washington, May 21.—A board of general officers of the army, headed by Brigadier General Kernan, acting assistant chief of staff, was in session today selecting 50 majors and captains of the line to be designated for duty on the general staff. The army bill signed by the president last week removes restriction upon the number of staff officers who may be kept in Washington and the full strength of three general officers and 38 others will be maintained hereafter.

Additional staff officers are necessary in connection with the organization of the cantonment camps to begin in July, when the national guard is assembled in individual units. There will be 32 camps altogether and an officer of the general staff will be assigned to each. It is regarded as probable also that a number of staff officers will be sent to the front in France, possibly with General Pershing's forces, to return after a few weeks and aid in the compilation of instruction manuals for troops which will incorporate modern developments of warfare.

Later as the forces in Europe are stationed, general headquarters will be necessary there with staff officers attached.

SWISS MOB FREES A SOCIALIST FROM JAIL

Chaux De Fonds, Switzerland, May 21 (via Paris).—Paul Grabe, a socialist national councillor, was freed from jail yesterday by a mob of sympathizers after he had been sentenced to eight days' imprisonment by a court-martial. Grabe was convicted of libel in connection with an article which appeared in his newspaper, La Sentinelle.

At the request of the council of the canton of Neuchatel, the general commanding the district has occupied Chaux De Fonds with a regiment of infantry and a squadron of cavalry. A mass meeting was called by the socialists Sunday evening and some rioting occurred, but calm was eventually restored.

Chaux De Fonds is nine miles from Neuchatel and is one of the principal centers of the watch-making industry in Europe. Its population in 1901 was 35,288.

STATE OFFICERS OF RED MEN TO MEET HERE



EAGLES HONOR MEMORY OF DEAD

Impressive Annual Ceremony Held at Empire Theater Yesterday.

Despite the stormy weather, hundreds of the members of the organization marched through the principal streets yesterday to the Empire theater to take part in the annual memorial exercises for the 31 members of the Fraternal Order of Eagles who had passed away during the past year, as well as for the more than 200 members who had died since the society was established in Butte. Andy McConnell, president of the Helenaerie, delivered the eulogy, and Don King, president of the Butteerie, and Dan Hanley, chaplain, were in charge of the ceremonial.

The beautiful storge effects, the solemn music and the decorations of carnations made the ceremonial a most touching one. The program as given in the Post Saturday was carried out without a hitch. Mr. McConnell said in part in the course of his eulogy: "By our presence here we are called upon to meditate upon the transitoriness of life, the certainty of death, the hope of immortality. Upon occasions of this kind we receive from the dead the fruitful message of example. When we covered our loved ones with the cloths of earth and our own tears we learned that life is but a transient guest, that we must so live that we are not afraid to die, for death does not discriminate; he strikes down the mighty in their places of high degree with the same grim impartiality as he makes desolate the peasant cot; he knocks alike on palace gate and cottage door. With wide-flung arms and blatant voice he rides the tempest blast; with drunken, iron-shod feet he reels across the world and sweeps the universe in flame and acrid smoke, and then again he comes silently like an evening shadow and gently presses down the lids on tired eyes and steals the breath from some poor mortal who hardly cares, with touch as tender as a mother's hand. But whether he comes with the crushing force of the axe of a Richard or in manner and form as soft and soothing as a mother's kiss, the grim reaper leaves behind a heritage of pain and sorrow. The full sum of man's knowledge concerning death is the certainty that it will come. We have seen death wander with relentless tread into the forests of this order and hew therefrom its sturdiest oaks, its most promising saplings; pluck therefrom the buds of spring and the sear and yellow leaves of autumn. Men in the flush and morning of their manhood, and others who had passed the meridian of life, have passed beyond our horizon, beyond the twilight purple hills, beyond the utmost reach of human harm or help, to that vast realm of silence or joy where innumerable dwell. And they have left with us their wealth of thought and deed—the memory of brave, unbrave, a honest man who bowed alone to death.

McGloin, or "Donegal" as he was better known, was a familiar figure of this city. He was a very well read man and a most entertaining conversationalist. He was born in Ireland but had lived in Butte for a number of years. Recently he had been working at the Southern Cross mines and had come to Butte for a well-earned rest.

There are no relatives in Butte and friends are making the arrangements for the funeral. The remains are at Daniels and Bibbo's establishment and the funeral will be held from there tomorrow morning, proceeding to the Sacred Heart church, where requiem high mass will be celebrated.
