

**SEEKS \$30,000 FOR BROKEN PROMISE**

**Suit of Miss Daisy Kennedy Against George A. Dunn is Commenced.**

The breach of promise suit of Daisy E. Kennedy against George A. Dunn was commenced before Judge McClellan and a jury this morning with Attorneys Joseph H. Griffin and A. W. Stangeland representing the plaintiff and Attorneys D. M. and J. E. Kelly appearing for the defendant. The parties to the suit are residents of Boulder.

According to the statement of the plaintiff, Dunn, who is said to be worth \$30,000 in land and other property in Jefferson county, agreed to marry her, the engagement taking place Jan. 4, 1916, at Boulder. After the engagement the plaintiff went to Denver, Colo., to visit her mother and in a letter, introduced in evidence, Dunn wrote to her while there enclosing a draft with which to pay her expenses to this city, where they were to be married in June at the home of the sister of plaintiff. After Miss Kennedy returned to this state, it is claimed that Dunn asked that the marriage ceremony be postponed until September, or until such time as he had his crops harvested and disposed of. Later, it is stated by the plaintiff, the defendant informed her that he would not marry her at all. The defendant in his answer to the complaint does not deny that he promised to marry the plaintiff, but says that no time was set for the performance of the wedding ceremony and that up to the time she brought the suit for damages he stood ready to carry out his part of the contract.  
The plaintiff is asking for \$30,000 damages.

**BAILIFF PLACED NAME ON THE VENIRE LIST**

**Clerk of Court Exonerated in Probe During Frisco Bomb Case Trial.**

San Francisco, May 31.—Gaitano Malpiede, superior court bailiff, admitted in court today that "maybe" he wrote in the name of a salesman on a venire list in the murder trial of Mrs. Rena Mooney, now in progress here. The state has demanded that on this account all jurors be dismissed.

Malpiede's admission came after a grilling by Assistant District Attorney Louis Ferrari, and after Frank Butler, clerk of court, had been exonerated.  
"Isn't this your hand writing?" Ferrari demanded.  
"I couldn't say," Malpiede replied.  
Ferrari switched to another tack and presently came back.  
"Look at this," he said, pointing to the list. "Didn't you write it?"  
"Well, maybe I did," replied Malpiede.  
He said that Daniel Kelly, the juror wrongly summoned, had asked that he be called for jury service if Malpiede could arrange it.

Harry I. Mulerevy, county clerk, said Malpiede's statement completely cleared Clerk Butler, whom he had suspended early in the day.  
Mrs. Mooney's trial grew from a bomb explosion here last July, which killed 18 persons.
