### POLICE ARE READY WITH FAST AUTOS

Twelve Machines Will Be Stationed at Headquarters During Registration.

Twelve fast automobiles, donated by citizens, will be at the service of the Butte police force during all of tomorrow and the entire force will be at headquarters ready to respond at the least sign of trouble. At any time of the day, at any place in the city, 20 police officers may be sent within five minutes notice.

"I don't anticipate trouble tomorrow," said Mayor Maloney. "But, we will be ready for any emergency."

"Registrars have been given the authority to make arrests and the whole police force is back of them."

Rumors that I. W. W.'s have been flocking to Butte during the past two or three days with the intention of causing trouble at the registration places have been investigated by the chief. These rumors, he said, are without foundation. There may be some members of the clan within the city limits, but these are few and not capable of stirring up strife.

Forty shotguns and rifles are loaded and will be on hand for the policemen to use tomorrow if the occasion arises.

Washington, June 4.—In construction of railways across federal forest reserves, the supreme court decided today that federal permits must be secured and regulations complied with.

The court affirmed a judgment for \$68,000 against the St. Paul road for damages to the Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, forest reservation during construction of its Puget Sound extension in 1907.

### JOHN DREW COMING IN DELIGHTFUL OFFERING
