

TO KEEP UP WORK UNTIL HOSPITAL FUND IS RAISED

Intensive Campaign for Deaconess Hospital Closes Today, But Workers Will Continue Their Efforts Until \$150,000 Has Been Pledged for Butte's New Hospital. To Date \$68,454.75 Has Been Subscribed. The Campaigners Pledge Themselves to Continue the Work.

While the intensive campaign which the Butte Deaconess hospital workers have been waging for the past two weeks will come to a formal close with

build the hospital has been secured.

This became assured today when the 100 workers attached their names to an agreement to work unceasingly until the money is secured. The agreement under which the workers bind themselves reads as follows:

"We, the undersigned members of the Deaconess Hospital corps, hereby agree to bind ourselves to devote one hour each day, Sundays and holidays excepted, to the purpose of raising the \$150,000 in actual subscriptions, of which \$68,454 is now raised, necessary for the perfect commencement of the hospital, and agree that we will not cease our efforts until this amount is complete.

"We agree to report our results at lunch at Gamer's at 12:10 every Tues- day."

With the close of the intensive cam- paign a final drive will be made upon Anaconda. For the past few days a campaign committee has been at work in the Smelter City. This committee, composed of W. M. Montgomery, D. R. McRae, Charles Avery and Jesse Lacken, has thus far succeeded in raising \$500. It is believed that \$5,000 can be secured in Anaconda, and to add an impetus to the campaign there

8 or 10 Butte workers will invade the Smelter City Thursday and Friday and assist the committee there in making a whirlwind drive.

Although there still remains plenty of work ahead, the present campaign has been a huge success. "It has been the most popular movement ever launched in Butte," declared J. H. Mitchell, financial secretary, this morning. "While we will formally close the intensive campaign tomor- row, it is the purpose of the workers to carry on the work with greater energy until the \$150,000 has been sub- scribed. A great many of the larger interests have their donations under consideration. The campaign com- mittee believes that many of these will come forward with substantial sub- scriptions. One of the encouraging features of the campaign has been the great number of people who have sub- scribed without solicitation."

Campaign headquarters will be moved to 619 Daly Bank building, where they will be permanently main- tained.

While the books today show a total subscription of \$68,454, Secretary Mitchell believes this total will be raised to \$75,000 by tomorrow when

the workers make their final reports. There are a number of substantial subscriptions which will be announced at that time and in addition there are several excellent prospects which may materialize by that time. Besides there are 4,000 postcard appeals which have been sent out the past few days, and which are still to be heard from.

Intense rivalry exists among the various teams for the honors of the final effort. Mrs. Grigg's division which led yesterday with \$812 will make an ef- fort to hold the flag, but Colonel Car- roller, Jackman, Lutey, Lewis and Genz- berger each declared today that they will wrest the honors from Mrs. Grigg's division.

Secretary Mitchell is greatly en- couraged over the subscriptions made by the employes of various business houses. A list circulated among the Lutey employes netted more than \$400. The employes of the Clark smelter subscribed \$612, the employes of the Montana Iron works subscribed \$100 and the employes of the Montana Hardware company agreed to pay a similar amount. Subscription lists in a dozen other business houses are still outstanding.
