

American Army's Hardest Fighter Now in Europe to Prepare For the Arrival of His Soldiers

HOW PERSHING WON HIS WAY TO TOP RANK

"Black Jack," as He is Known to His Men, Has Envyable Record.

Washington, June 8.—If you were to go out to the little town of Laclede, in Linn county, Missouri, where Maj. Gen. Pershing was born, and were to ask "Aunt Susan" Hewitt, 75, and still sunny, what she knows about John Joseph Pershing, she would say: "Mercy me, I remember John when he wa'n't more than three years old. I can see him now playing out in the road with his little dress bobbing up and down. "When John got big he used to eat

more pie in our kitchen than any other boy in town." And then if you were to hunt up Charles Spurgeon, over in Brookfield, who was Pershing's school chum, he would say: "We knew each other as only two boys can who are always together. "There was something about him that went true to the mark. You could tell even then that he was headed somewhere. "When he gets the word to go he is going to go and nothing in the world is going to stop him." Pershing is known in the army as "Black Jack." As a boy he was called "tow head," because until he was nearly grown his hair was almost white. Pershing was born in 1859 and ever since he was able to toddle has been making the landscape take notice. In 1886 he was graduated from West Point, after having gone there with the intention of later becoming a lawyer. But in 1887 the Indians went on the warpath and Pershing went with the Sixth cavalry and taught Geronimo how to run. After that Pershing's career was settled.

From 1891 to 1895 he was detailed professor of military science at University of Nebraska and at the same time studied law, winning the LL.B. degree. In 1898 he was tactical officer at West Point. In 1899 he was at El Caney, captain of the Tenth cavalry, and called the "bravest, coolest man under fire." After the Spanish war the Moros began "acting up" and Pershing was needed again. He sailed into his job and made the Moros respect him and his country. He blew up 44 Moro forts, taking the last and strongest after having taken his guns in the night to 100 yards of it, blowing it to pieces at day-break. After that he used diplomacy. When Francisco Villa rode across the line at Columbus, N. M., Pershing was ordered into Mexico after him. Pershing's record in Mexico is one of the bright spots on a record that is a continuous row of bright spots. When Pershing came back from the Philippines he was made brigadier general over the heads of 362 superior officers, the record jump for the army. Shortly after he came out of Mexico he was made major general.

Pershing was married in 1895 to Frances Warren of Cheyenne, Wyo., daughter of Senator Warren of that state. In August, 1916, Mrs. Pershing and three of the four children died in a fire at the Presidio, San Francisco. Pershing is a 32nd degree Mason, member of the Metropolitan Army and Navy clubs in Washington, Army and Navy club of New York and Hamilton club of Chicago. RIFE IS GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Given Not Less Than Two Nor More Than Four Years. Jury Out 17 Hours.

After being out for a little over 17 hours, the jury came into court this morning at 10:30 o'clock and reported a verdict of manslaughter in the case of John Rife, charged with the murder of Ivan Svekoff, and fixed his punishment at not less than two years nor more than four years in the state prison. He will appear for sentence before Judge Dwyer a week from tomorrow. Rife was placed on trial Wednesday morning, with Attorney William Meyer appearing in his behalf and County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, Chief Deputy N. A. Rotering and Deputy

County Attorney Frank L. Rife representing the state. Rife was charged with having stabbed in the breast Ivan Svekoff in a Greek coffee house on Christmas night. The evidence introduced in the early part of the trial tended to show that Rife was in the coffee house at the time of the stabbing, but rebuttal testimony produced yesterday afternoon by the state seemed to leave no doubt as to the guilt of Rife. Rife, as he was leaving the courtroom this morning after hearing the verdict of the jury, credited the impression that he was well accepted with the verdict. Wearing a cap with his face, he waved his hat to his countrymen and exclaimed, "Long, boys!" THREE DEPARTMENTS All three departments of the district court are idle today. In the Dwyer's Rife murder case, which has been set for today, in Judge McClellan's department the case set for today was continued, while in Judge Jackson's department the jury cases for the week were concluded yesterday.
