# TWENTY THREE FUNERALS OF MINE FIRE VICTIMS

Burial of Disaster's Dead Again Brings Home Extent of Sorrow and Bereavement in City. Five Masses of Requiem Said During Morning at Single Church. Undertakers, Liverymen and Cab Companies Taxed to Utmost to Furnish Equipment.

Funerals of 23 victims of the Speculator mine fire again brought home to Butte today the awfulness of the disaster which has brought sorrow and bereavement to hundreds of homes and cast a pall over the city. Thirty-five unidentified victims of the fire were buried last night in the special lot set aside in Mountain View cemetery for that purpose and seven more of the unidentified were interred this morning. Every livery rig, every hack and every automobile in rent service was engaged today. Local undertakers were taxed to their utmost capacity to furnish equipment for the many funerals.

Five masses of requiem for as many victims of the disaster were said at Sacred Heart church this morning; three at St. Lawrence church; two at St. Joseph's; one at St. Mary's, and one at Holy Saviour. Services for 10 of the victims were held at local Protestant churches, homes of victims and undertakers' establishments.

# ONLY TWO MINES ARE SHUT DOWN

I. W. W. Agitation for Strike in Butte Has Little Effect.

(Continued from Page One.)

In Butte gathered at the Finn hall on North Wyoming street, where they effected an organization which assumed the name of the Metal Mine Workers of Butte. Tom Campbell, notorious so-called deportation committee in Butte three years ago, presided as chairman. Joe Shannon, equally prominent in the troubles of three years ago and a well-known socialist, was recording secretary. A grievance committee was also named. On this committee was proposed the name of a Cornish miner. At once there went up a protest against a Cornishman and he was not permitted to serve. On the other hand, when a German was proposed for this committee he was accepted with a cheer. Every reference to the soldiers now stationed here, the men who are in the uniform of the government and soon will be fighting under the flag in France, was received with hisses. On the other hand, the disloyal leaders of the Pearce-Connolly club and other German sympathizers were cheered. The Finn element in control is anti-American and disloyal in every sense to the government in the present war crisis.

A sub-committee was named to picket mines. If that committee was on the job today, it didn't make itself felt. There was no picketing, although it is assumed that the Finns in instances intimidated men who otherwise would have worked.

Meeting Today.  
At 4 o'clock this afternoon the Finns

are again in session at their hall, which was crowded. They heard reports from committees and agreed to continue the agitation for a general strike.

It was noticed that at yesterday's and today's meetings the Serbians, Montenegrians and Austrians were conspicuous by their absence. The trouble-makers are confined in large part to the Finns, who, in many places throughout the country since the war began, have shown their disloyalty to the United States government. The Butte movement is understood to be an attempt to embarrass the government, which requires copper for war munitions at this time. They considered the time opportune to call a strike, although such a demonstration is nothing short of reasonable.

It is understood that an application to join the Silver Bow Trades and Labor council has been turned down. Organized labor has made it plain that it wants nothing to do with the I. W. W. men who are in control of the present agitation. M. M. Donoghue, president of the Montana State Federation of Labor, declared last night that the new society would not be recognized by the bona fide labor organizations of Butte, but that it was likely a branch of the United Mine and Mill Workers of America would be formed in Butte.

# As to Organized Labor.

"The labor unions are not in sympathy with any movement which has as its purpose merely the causing of trouble or which seeks to disrupt the production of copper at a time when the American government is so sorely in need of this metal. Any organization with the stamp of the I. W. W. could not possibly be a success and would do more harm than good to the men who work underground. We don't want an organization under sinister or irresponsible leadership. "I don't want to be misunderstood as saying that the 'men who assembled yesterday were I. W. W. irresponsible or objectionable. For the most part they were good, clean-cut working men, but it was patent that I. W. W.'—in fact, the very element which broke

up the Miners' union in Butte in the initiative and attempt to capture the organization. The Montana Federation of Labor has been in common with the I. W. W. organization under the leadership of the 'Wobblies' can get control of jurisdiction in this district."

# Will Protect Men.

The determined stand of the companies to continue work under all circumstances and to protect their employees has done much to allay the fear of the people of Butte that the 'Wobblies' might again be organized as a serious labor crisis. The companies are in a measure weary for the government of the protection of the government. They are perfectly willing to handle the situation. Ample wages have been taken to protect the miners and the I. W. W. men are not permitted to dictate in this matter. Mayor Maloney, in voting for the time being today, said that the authorities would use drastic measures if needed to deal with the situation. At the same time he said that old-time miners would be given every consideration.
