W. M. ALBEE SENDS IN A RECORD ORDER

Overland Dealer Has 140 Automobiles En Route to Butte.

W. M. Albee of the Overland-Albee company in Butte, in face of war, threatened strikes and other troubles, maintains the spirit of optimism that has made him a record-breaking sales year.

"Butte never had a better outlook," said Mr. Albee. "How can any one talk of trouble with God's sun overhead and the beauties of Montana calling Butte's people to the wonderful out-of-doors?"

"We have 140 cars on the road to Butte this minute. Most of these are sold and the remainder will be distributed during the coming week. A duplicate order will be wired to Toledo within a few days and this is going to be the greatest Overland year in the history of the state."

The Overland 90's are selling fast in Butte. Owners everywhere praise the little car and Mr. Albee says his service station where repairs are made has been the most idle spot in Butte for months.

RAISE IN PRICE OF CHANDLER CAR

I. M. Wheeler Announces \$200 Will Be Added to Rates After June 30.

I. M. Wheeler, local distributor for the Chandler automobile, today announced that on July 1 an advance in price will be made of \$200 on the well known car. Mr. Wheeler has tipped off his prospective customers and several orders during the day were the result.

"There will be an advance of \$200 in the price of all Chandler cars, effective with the close of business, June 30," said Mr. Wheeler this morning.

"The company wishes to emphasize two facts: first, that the Chandler car subsequent to July 1 will be identically the same car as is now being built; second, that the Chandler car at \$1,595 will still be under-priced. The advance in price effective on and after July 1 has been made necessary by greatly increased costs which have risen this spring by reason of unprecedented conditions in the material supply and labor markets and in the price of transportation."

"Production costs throughout the past three months have advanced steadily and in long strides. This is a condition which the Chandler company cannot control, but a condition which it must meet."

Mr. Wheeler says he will take orders for Chandlers at present prices until midnight June 30.

BIGGEST GARAGE IN UNITED STATES

Butte Can Now Boast of Great Storage Room for Automobiles.

Butte now has the biggest one-floor garage in the United States, according to the claims of the owners of the Broadway Garage company on East Broadway, opened this week for the public. Already the place is half filled with automobiles, the owners of which have taken advantage of the splendid equipment of the new concern.

HURRY-UP YOST BUYS FORD CAR

Famous Football Coach Will Make Trips to Gridiron in Ford Sedan.

Followers of University of Michigan football teams would have been surprised to learn, a few weeks ago, that Fielding H. Yost, the mentor of Maize and Blue gridiron performers since 1901, had affixed his name to a contract not offered by the Ann Arbor authorities, says C. V. Fulton, local distributor.

There is no cause for gossip in the above announcement. Yost will be back at Ann Arbor next fall, with his smile and his stogie. What the famous football instructor really signed was a buyer's order and agreement for a Ford sedan.

Yost is a man of few words—except between halves, when Michigan's opponents happen to be on the long end of the score—but when he does talk, things begin to take place. He followed his usual custom in buying a Ford car. He didn't advertise for bids but looked the field over, communed with himself, watched the cars on the road every day—and bought a Ford. His conversation with the agent at Nashville, Tenn., where he spends the winter, consisted of "I want a Ford car."

After driving his sedan for a time, the "Hurry-Up" person was moved to more generous speech. "If I could have the good fortune," said he, "to put out a football team as powerful as my Ford motor, we'd run away with the championship every year." And that's a lot of conversation for Mr. Yost.

FISHIN'S FINE SAYS VINEYARD

Supply Station in North Arizona Street Will Be Open Early Tomorrow.

Half of Butte will go fishing tomorrow, according to G. W. Vineyard, local agent for the National Tire company on North Arizona street. About one-half of the "one-half" said Mr. Vineyard will make the trip to the fishing streams in automobiles.

URUGUAY AGREES WITH THE STAND OF BRAZIL

New York, June 16.—A communication sent by the government of Uruguay to the government of Brazil regarding Brazil's departure from its attitude of neutrality in the war was made public here today by Joseph Reiling, consul general of Uruguay, with approval of Dr. Carlos Ma De Pena, Uruguayan minister to Washington.

The government of Uruguay, it says, is in full sympathy and accord with the ideals expressed in the Brazilian note and reiterates its "desire to see the American countries collectively adopt a joint policy to the end that these countries, united as they are by everlasting bonds of democracy and identical conceptions of justice and liberty, may achieve a solidarity beneficial to all."

"The principles and interests involved logically demand for the free development of the countries a close union of action so that any act perpetrated against one of the countries of America in violation of the precepts of international law as universally recognized shall constitute an offense against all of them."
