Brothers Are Laid Side by Side in the Mountain View Cemetery.

The funerals of five more of the men who were killed in the North Butte disaster were held today. Two brothers, Sam and Alexander Borden, who were killed in the fire, were buried side by side in the Mountain View cemetery this afternoon. Services were held at the Greek Orthodox Catholic church.

The vessel was unarmed. Reports had been current in shipping circles for some days that the Tansan Maru had been lost, but it was not until today that the agents received definite information.

FRENCH TRANSPORT IS LOST; NO CASUALTIES

Paris, June 16.—It is officially announced that the transport Annam was torpedoed and sunk in the Ionian sea on June 11, while proceeding under escort. Bombs were at once thrown from the bow of the submarine, which did not reappear. There were no casualties.

DETROIT'S GUNNERS ALL WERE SAVED

Washington, June 16.—All the crew of naval gunners of the American submarine Detroit, sunk by a German submarine near Gibraltar, now have been accounted for and are reported well.

TWO TORPEDOES MISSED THEIR MARK

An Atlantic Port, June 16.—An American steamer arriving early today reported an engagement with a German submarine off Brest, France, May 1, in which the U boat fired two torpedoes, one at her bow and one at her stern but neither found its mark. The vessel made a hit. After ten shots from the submarine disappeared. Off the coast of Ireland the American steamer picked up three members of the crew of a Norwegian lumber ship which was torpedoed and sunk 20 miles ahead of the American ship. The survivors were landed at Queenstown.

SAYS LOST SUBMARINE WAS NOT GERMAN BOAT

Amsterdam, June 16.—An official statement issued in Berlin says the submarine sunk by the Kroonland could not have been German, as all German submarines which were off the fish coast on May 15 have returned.

SCHOONER UNDER FIRE

Elizabeth, N. J., June 16.—The American four-masted schooner Anna R. Holtzer was fired upon and damaged by a submarine off Gibraltar yesterday.

second "retreat to victory" materialized. The Italians having successfully maintained their advance in the face of the most formidable Austrian counter attacks, are apparently preparing for a resumption of their offensive. Vienna reports that the Italian guns have opened with the greatest violence in Carinthia.

Spanish Throne Menaced.

The upheaval caused by the great war, which has already hurled two monarchs from their thrones, now menaces the ancient throne of Spain. The utmost exertions of the Spanish censors have failed to completely suppress the reports of grave happenings in the peninsula kingdom. From what little is known the Spanish army is taking the lead in the revolutionary movement, which is further accelerated by the food scarcity and industrial unrest.

GERMAN ATTACKS ON THE YPRES LINE FAIL

London, June 15.—Repulse of a German attack on the positions captured by the British south of the Ypres-Comines canal after heavy artillery preparation is announced by the war office.

INCREASED FIGHTING ON RUSSIAN FRONT

Vienna, June 15 (via London).—Increased fighting on the Russian front in East Galicia and Volhynia was reported by the war office Friday. The repulse of an Italian attack at Mont Rombon and a violent increase in the fire of the Italian artillery in Carinthia also are reported.

THE ITALIANS STORM FORTIFIED POSITIONS

Rome (via London), June 15.—Ital-

ian forces have carried Corno Cavento, a strongly fortified Austrian position in the eastern Trentino, the war office announces today.

FIGHTING AGAIN ON BULLECCOURT FRONT

Berlin, June 15 (via London).—Fresh engagements between British and German forces developed early today in the Bullecourt region and east of Monchy. German army headquarters staff announced today.

REPLY ASSURINGLY TO THE KAISER'S MESSAGE

Copenhagen, June 15 (via London).—Admiral von Tirpitz and Field Marshal von Hindenburg have replied approvingly to telegrams of greeting from the kaiser.

BERLIN OFFICIALLY INFORMED OF THE CRISIS AT ATHENS

Amsterdam (via London), June 15.—

ALL THE NEWSPAPERS IN GERMANY PUBLISH THE TELEGRAM RECEIVED BY THE GREEK LEGATION AT BERLIN FROM PREMIER ZAIMIS INFORMING THE MINISTER OF THE ABDIICATION OF KING CONSTANTINE. THE TELEGRAM CONCLUDES: "THE PAIN OF THE GREEK PEOPLE AT PARTING FROM KING CONSTANTINE AND QUEEN SOPHIE WAS INDISCRIbable."

PERSHING HONORED IN FRENCH ARMY ORDER

Paris, June 15.—The army committee of the chamber of deputies has adopted a resolution recommending the remitting of all outstanding punishments in honor of General Pershing. The resolution also requests that an extra ration of a pint of wine be served to the soldiers in celebration of the arrival of the American general.

NEW ADMIRAL FOR BLACK SEA FLEET

Petrograd, June 15 (via London).—The newspapers report that Admiral Madimoff, commander of the Black Sea fleet, has left his post and will be replaced by Rear Admiral Verdervski, chief in the Caucasus, has been replaced by General Prelevsky.

LARGE FOOD SHIPMENTS ARRIVING IN BELGIUM

London, June 15.—The American commission for relief in Belgium announced today that since June 7, 11 of their ships, carrying an aggregate of 50,000 tons of foodstuffs, have arrived at Rotterdam. It is expected an equal number will reach that port in the next two weeks.

THE RECEIPT OF THIS FOODSTUFF WILL AID IN RELIEVING THE SERIOUS FOOD SHORTAGE IN THE OCCUPIED PORTIONS OF BELGIUM AND FRANCE, WHERE FOR SOME TIME THE FOOD SUPPLIES HAVE BEEN SO LOW THAT THERE HAVE BEEN LOCAL FAMINES.

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
