HERBERT S. RILEY KILLED IN ACCIDENT ON THE FLAT

Well-Known Young Auto Expert and Salesman Loses His Life When Machine Throws a Front Wheel and Turns Turtle While Going at a Rapid Rate of Speed. Community Shocked by News of Accident. Funeral to Be Held Wednesday.

Herbert S. Riley, holder of many automobile racing records, rode his last ride alone last night in his beloved Cadillac and his dead body was carried to Butte by R. L. Rhule, who picked it up from the wreckage of the car one mile north of the Nine Mile. News of Mr. Riley's death flashed about the city and brought sorrow to many hearts.

The Cadillac dealer left Butte yesterday for Dillon and was returning via Twin Bridges and the Eighteen-mile canyon. It was upon his return trip, about 9:30 o'clock in the evening that the accident happened. Mrs. John C. Hanley of 251 Pacific street, Centerville, was a witness to the tragedy. She was driving a car following Mr. Riley and said he was putting on speed to make a grade when one of the front wheels came off and the car turned completely over, crushing the occupant, then landing again on its wheels, leaving its crushed and bleeding victim on the ground 19 feet away. The car was driven back to town after a new wheel was put on last night.

When Mr. Rhule reached the scene, Riley was still breathing, but unconscious. He died in Mr. Rhule's arms a few minutes after he was taken into the Rhule car. A. J. Davis met Mr. Riley near the Wellcome ranch early last evening. Riley was coming from Dillon, so he told Mr. Davis, and had turned into the road to Butte off the River Front road which leads from Whitehall to Twin Bridges. Mr. Davis said: "He was working on the wheel—which later caused the accident—hammering it. He stated that the roads were bad. I was starting for Butte myself at the time and had instructed my chauffeur to put on the chains. I had chosen the road which swings on a hypotenuse from the ranch instead of taking the direct road which Mr.

Riley took and which was very wet. "This is a new car," said Riley, "and I am having a little trouble with it. "I will go back to Rhule's ranch and get some oil. He has a tractor there." That was the last I saw of the poor boy. Mr. Rhule had left the ranch at the time, but his man was there.

Many in Butte will take Herb Riley's smile and his expressions of optimism by which he arose in Butte from a printer's "devil" in the office of the old Butte Evening News to the owner of a splendid automobile business and to the proprietorship of a theater—the Liberty. He knew no obstacle too big for him to overcome and the only defect of his life came when he gripped with death.

Riley won his first fame in Butte as a driver, when he stripped a Ford and ran a handicap race with Barney Oldfield on the old Butte race track. He won the race. Later he established a record, which still stands, between here and Anaconda.

For some time Riley drove for John G. Morony. The two men later became fast friends. Seven years ago Riley started in business as a member of the Warner-Riley Auto Supply company on West Broadway. Then he secured the Ford agency and a new company, known as the Merritt-Riley, was organized.

One day Riley discovered he had failed in business as the local Ford dealer. The following morning he filled his dinner bucket and walked up the hill. For some time he shoveled concrete at \$3.50 per day. Then he got the Cadillac agency. Within a short time he built a new garage at 22 East Quartz street and his success is demonstrated by the large number of Cadillacs to be seen on the streets. Always a booster for Butte, Riley could not stand any show of disturbance that might "close the camp down." He volunteered his services as a special officer on Registration day when trouble seemed brewing. Afraid of no man, he dived into the crowds and scattered the people. On Registration day he donated four of his automobiles to the city and refused to accept pay.

Mr. Riley's death was a terrible shock to his pretty young wife, who received the news last night from C. J. Kelly and Mr. Rhule. Their home was at 1022 West Gold street. Mrs. Riley was formerly Miss Carrie Lowry.

For the second time in two years Mrs. C. R. Williams, the mother, heard of the death of a son. Herbert's brother Frank died about two years ago. Besides his wife and mother, the deceased is survived by three uncles, Dr. J. E. Tait, Robert E. Tait and W. G. Tait. It is believed that Riley was visiting Robert E. Tait of Whitehall on a business matter yesterday when he started on his last ride home.

It is a strange coincidence that Frank Riley, brother of the deceased, died two years ago from last night—on a Sunday—within five minutes of the hour that Riley met his death.

INCH PLACED ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Accused of Killing Lazar Kovacevich Over Ownership of a Ring.

Marion Inch is on trial before Judge John V. Dwyer and a jury today charged with the murder of Lazar Kovacevich, with County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, Chief Deputy N. A. Rotering and Deputy County Attorney Frank L. Riley representing the state and Attorneys H. I. Maury and A. G. Shoon appearing in behalf of the defendant. It is alleged that during a row in the saloon at 32 East Park street over the ownership of a ring Inch killed Kovacevich on the evening of April 15 of the present year. Attorney Dan T. Malloy had been engaged in the case in behalf of the defendant, but with the consent of the court he was allowed to withdraw after he had made the statement that he did not feel he was in a position to go to trial with the case and the name of Attorney Maury was substituted.

When the noon recess hour was reached a jury had not been secured and the indications are the greater part of the afternoon will be required to secure 12 men to hear the case. The state had two challenges and the defendant five left at noon.

FATHER NOT EFFICIENT.



GERMANY READY TO TAKE UP PROPOSALS TO MAKE PEACE Stockholm, Saturday, June 16 (via London, June 17).—Additional details of the German peace offer to Russia are contained in the Social Democratic's translation of the telegram, said to have been addressed by A. Hoffman, a member of the Swiss federal council, to Robert Grimm, a Swiss socialist, who went to Russia. It said, "I am convinced that Germany and her allies would immediately take up peace negotiations at the wish of Russia's allies. As to what concerns the German war aim, you can read articles in the Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. There, after consultation with Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, the declaration has been made regarding annexation to the effect that Germany does not desire any increase in her territory, nor any economic or political expansion."
