

# WAMMOTH CROPS IN WESTERN CANADA

### Increased Acreage and Bright Prospects Reported by Charles Melin.

The crop situation in western Canada is very encouraging at the present time, according to Charles A. Melin, district passenger agent of the Great Northern, who is in the city to-day on business on his way home to Denver after his annual visit to the western territory. Mr. Melin covers the entire western country for his line, and is as far south as Mexico, Melin said today.

There is increased acreage in western Canada and the crops will be bountiful this season. The farmers are most cheerful and there is evidence of the existence of a boom in at least the western portion of the country to the north.

The number of foreign railroad cars and around Edmonton and Dunvegan road, a new line running north to Edmonton, is an indication of a movement of settlers from the United States to Canada.

## REPORTS OF UNREST IN SPAIN OFFICIALLY DENIED AT CAPITAL

Washington, June 20.—The Spanish ambassador, Juan Riano today issued the following statement in regard to published reports of unrest in Spain:

Certain complaints of an interior character in one of the branches of the line of the army have been attended to insofar as they were just and they are in no way related with interior politics and far less with the international policy of Spain, which is being developed normally within the monarchical regime and constitutional practices."

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
