COLLEGES STIRRED BY DRISCOLL CASE

University Coaches Are Peeved Over Action of the Baseball "Pirates." Patsie Driscoll's advent into the Cub fold is likely to result in a casual bell between the conference colleges and organized baseball.

But Driscoll's case has gone straight to the heart of the Purple fan. Were it not for Patsie's personal popularity, a liking clearly outside his athletic popularity, it is probable the hero of the Chicago football game and of many other contests would find himself a "man without a college."

Patsie's loyalty is under discussion. No one goes so far as to deny a man has a right to quit college when he wishes, but there is a growing feeling among college men that an athlete owes a certain tenure of service for the opportunity given him by his university.

Another proposal is to strike from the university rolls any athlete who quits his college before entering professional sports. The effect of this ruling would depend largely on the temperament and loyalty of the undergraduate athlete for his college and its traditions.
