been dubious, has sent an ultimatum to General Chang Hsun, who restored the emperor, demanding that he withdraw from Peking within 24 hours. T'iao Kun is now mobilizing his forces. His action, it is considered, will endanger the chances of the monarchy.

Tuan Chi Jui, former premier, has accepted that post and is mobilizing 20,000 men in the province of Shan Tung to march against the monarchy. Nine alleged traitors, including Prince Pu Lun, chairman of the council of state, have been executed by Chang Hsun.

A dispatch from Shanghai says the military commissioner of Shanghai and the military governor of the province of Che Kiang refused to recognize the emperor.

Prince Pu Lun was the Chinese envoy at the St. Louis exposition in 1904. In 1907 he was authorized by imperial edict to frame regulations for the foundation of a parliament.

WOULD HAVE JAPAN  
KEEP HANDS OFF

Tokio, July 5.—Viscount Motono, foreign minister, interpellating the diet yesterday, said the restoration movement in China is causing anxiety in Japan, but as it concerns Chinese domestic relations, he believed peace in China would best be served by Japan remaining a spectator and refraining from interference, at least for the present.

DICTATOR MAY HAVE  
OVERPLAYED HAND

Washington, July 5.—The revolutionary movement restoring the Manchu dynasty to the throne of China is not being supported by all the military leaders of the north, according to dispatches from Minister Reinsch received today at the state department. With the whole south and part of the north solidly against the imperial restoration, the situation has begun to clarify to a certain degree and a cautious feeling is expressed that Chang Hsun may have overplayed his hand. If the anti-monarchical forces are able to join in an effective co-operation it is thought that the Peking district, to which the trouble appears largely confined, can be overwhelmed.

Chang Hsun's army, however, is formidable and the future offers many prospects of new alignments. It is thought possible that German gold that was withdrawn from industry into the banks may have some influence in keeping the situation in confusion.

FIRST PRESIDENT IS  
FIGHTING FOR REPUBLIC

San Francisco, July 5.—Dr. Sun Yat Yen, who was the first president of the republic of China, has been appointed commander in chief of the naval forces of Chinese provinces fighting for the preservation of the republic, according to cable advices received here today by the Chinese nationalist leader. The same report states that senators opposing the Manchu return to power have met in Nanking and decided on war, and that the southern army, loyal to democracy, has mobilized at Shanghai.

FORMER PREMIER CALLS  
PEOPLE TO SAVE CHINA

T'iao Tsin, July 5.—Tuan Chi Jui, former premier, has issued an eloquent denunciation of Manchu restoration, accusing General Chung Hsun, who played a leading part in restoration, of overweening ambition and of committing crimes of inconceivable magnitude. Tuan Chi Jui charged that the general was betraying the Manchus themselves, who were favorably situated, until Tuan Chi Jui interfered. Tuan Chi Jui said he had intended to remain in retirement but saw that the Manchus were being used as catspaws for brigandage. Now he calls on all provinces to put out every ounce of strength to save China from Chang Hsun.

### CONSPIRACY THE MOONEY CASE

San Francisco, July 5.—Certain testimony supporting the theory that a criminal conspiracy to a bomb explosion here was admitted as evidence to the trial of Mrs. Rena Mooney as the result of the explosion, claimed 10 lives. W. Billings, now under sentence of imprisonment in connection with the bomb murders, was by Thomas E. Thompson, a conductor, who testified that on the morning of June 11, nearly six years to the explosion, he saw carrying a suitcase, board his point close to where several towers had been dynamited previously. He overruled the objection by the defense that this testimony was of the sole purpose of identifying and not to prove the destruction of the towers.
