And the figures for the last two seasons show Heinie has been getting on base oftener than he did before that time.

The secret seems to be in an odd batting style the little Cincinnati is using, a style revived from the days of Old Pop Anson.

Cap Anson, a free, hard hitter, used it for years while he was piling up his record of 3,000 hits. Ping Bodie used it with telling effect in the American league, and Jimmie Callahan also batted from that position.

Under the tentative schedule Butte will play in Great Falls next week and Billings will play in Spokane. The following week, Great Falls will play in Billings and Spokane will return to Butte.

The Billings fans are trying to secure the Billings race track for grounds. It was agreed to play eight weeks more.
