

NEW RECORDS FOR THE TALKING MACHINE

"Marching Through Georgia" sung with "a spirit that will start the world along with it," is Morton Adkins' contribution to Columbia's repertory of patriotic recordings. The "good old lugle" sounds a thrilling introduction. And Mr. Adkins' powerful, resonant baritone moves in spontaneity with the words of the song, reflecting a roodly measure of the superb vocal strength with which those "fifty thousand strong" must have sung "Marching Through Georgia."

Mr. Adkins can well be proud of this record addition to his famous repertory, unsurpassed by any living singer, including over 40 standard and operatic roles, all the oratorios and no fewer than 3,000 songs, in English, French, German and Italian. America's "Vidiantes" never wrote into verse or speech a more superb patriotic appeal than that embodied in Meacham's "American Patrol," recently recorded by Prince's band for the Columbia Graphophone company. The resolute tread of undaunted feet and the measured rhythm of mounted cavalry are heard in the introduction. And as the intrepid melody whirrs into the strains of "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," the memory-graven words "three cheers for the Red, White and Blue!" leap spontaneously to the lips of the hearer. Then follows a stirring life and drum selection that is lost in a lively "Yankee Doodle" finale.

Harry Godfrey and Veta Henderson are a pair of funmakers who have a laughable vehicle styled "Catskill New York." It is cleverly arranged and a winner.


Nelson and Nelson are two agile comedians and have a number of feats never before presented on any stage. Their fun is of the wholesome kind and they never grow tiresome.

POST LISTS OF THE REGISTERED MEN

All Those Subject to Draft May Now Learn Their Serial Numbers.

With the posting of lists of the names of men registered for draft with their corresponding serial numbers in the offices of the city and county clerk, Butte and Silver Bow county now have completed all of the preliminaries for select service draft and the two local exemption boards, one for the city and the other for the county, are now marking time on the drawing, which will take place in Washington.

It was made very plain today that it will be impossible for the force at the city and county clerks' office to give out information concerning the numbers of registered men over the telephone. There are more than 5,000 men registered in the city and 3,375 in the county and to answer that many telephonic inquiries would necessitate employment of a corps of special operators.

The law provides that when any person is called by the local board, notice thereof shall be mailed by the clerk of such local board to each person so called, directed to the address on the registration card. It places upon every man, who is registered, however, the obligation of determining just what his serial number is, so that when that number is drawn, the man will know that he is the one designated for draft and govern himself accordingly.

Local officials thus far have been given no intimation of just when the drawing will be started, other than the statement appearing in the press that it will probably start next week.

Various progressive steps of the draft and workings of the exemption and appellate boards were published in yesterday's Post.

FAIR WEATHER ASSURED FOR SUNDAY PICNICKERS

For Third Time This Season Weather Bureau Forecasts Three Days Ahead.

For the third time this season the weather bureau at Helena forecasts fair weather for three days ahead. This may be taken as a sure indication that there will be fair weather tomorrow and very probably on Monday.

For years the weather bureau had not taken any chances on forecasting so far ahead but the former two predictions proved correct and consequently the present prediction may be relied on.
