BUTTE BOY'S CALL TO U. S. PATRIOTS

St. Charles College Student Gives Ringing Rally for the Flag.

Most appropriate at the present time is the reproduction of the article written by Emmet Riley, a well known young Butte boy, and published in the last issue of "The Prospector," the official publication of the Mount St. Charles college in Helena. Mr. Riley was born and educated in Butte and is one of the students of the college of the class of '18. He is studying for the priesthood and his eloquent language and patriotic thoughts on the subject, "The War's Bearing on the U. S. A.," provide good food for thought on the day on which the defenders of the nation's honor are being selected by national conscription. Mr. Riley's article is quoted in full as follows:

"Shall America be a nation?" was the question which the manhood of our glorious country was called upon to decide 149 years ago. Shall America remain intact as a nation? was the problem which the Americans of half a century ago were forced to determine. Shall America continue to hold its place among the powers of the earth, shall it preserve its national ideals, shall it stand forth as a mighty and undivided force, respected by friend and foe alike, the democracy for which Washington fought and Lincoln died? is the third crisis, no less momentous than that of 1776 or that of 1861, which our republic at present faces and which we Americans must again determine.

"World in Turmoil."
"The world is now aflame; the civilization to which we have been born is torn by the mightiest struggle in history. For two and a half years the United States has held the conflagration at bay, despite continued aggravation by the belligerents to bring us into the fray."
"A few months ago the honor of our country was at stake. The course of neutrality which we had pursued ceased to be the duty of our government. The course of action of the United States was evident. It was incumbent on those at the helm of the ship of state to uphold the dignity and honor of the American nation. Peace at any cost should not, in fact was not, to extend to peace without honor."
"When the honor of our country was outraged and the glory of the flag besmirched the flower of the manhood of America came forth ready to meet with force the enemies of our liberty, the defamers of our honor and the foes of our integrity. We, though of many minds and many bloods, rise up to tell the world that we are of one flag, one land, one heart, one hand, one nation, now and forever. We stand by our president, we stand by the Red, White and Blue, to prove to the world that we are a united people. United we stand!"

Adopted Sons.
"When danger threatens our fatherland and our homes, our adopted sons, whose names are enrolled on the pages of Columbia's family, will prove that their blood is as red, their skin as white and their veins as blue as the red and the white and the blue of the flag they have sworn to sustain and uphold, to maintain and support. They may love the land of their sires much, but they love the land of their children more. They may cherish the memory of the sod from which they sprung but they stand ready to die for the soil they have hallowed with their homes."
"Secure in our conviction that America comes first with every American, confident that the great warm heart of the republic beats true and strong, convinced that the stars of the heavens are not more firmly fixed than the stars of America's flag are enshrined in the hearts of America's citizens, we today show our devotion and loyalty."
"O beautiful and grand,
"My own, my Native land,
"Of thee I boast,
"Great Empire of the West
"The dearest and the best,
"Made up of all the rest,
"I love thee most!"
"God bless our flag and its loyal defenders, while its broad folds are waving o'er the battle field, till the dim stars wreath rekindles its splendor, washed from its stains in the blood of the brave."
"Praised be the power that hath made and preserved us a nation,
"Then conquer we must when our cause it is just,
"And this be our motto, 'In God is our trust,'
"And the Star Spangled banner in triumph shall wave
"Over the land of the free and the home of the brave."

RUFFNER'S ALLOWANCE REDUCED TO \$8,000

Remittitur From the Supreme Court Received by District Court Clerk.

A remittitur was received by the clerk of the district court today in the case of the M. J. Connel company against W. J. Ruffner, reducing the amount of the allowance to the defendant as received from \$17,000 to \$8,000. When the Connel receiver Mr. Ruffner was appointed receiver and at the conclusion of his term of office he was allowed by the district court \$17,000 for his services. On an appeal to the supreme court in which Justice Saner delivered the judgment, the allowance was reduced to \$8,000.
