WHAT SERVICE RIBBONS MEAN

Little Strips of Color on Uniforms Have Meaning of Their Own.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., July 29.—If you happen to see an army officer these days with a dash of color on his left breast—and the chances are you have seen many—you may or may not be consumed with curiosity as to the meaning of that medley of brilliant hues.

The mail received at the war department indicates a large degree of public curiosity on the subject, as the department is receiving many inquiries from the public as to the meaning of the various insignia worn on the uniforms of the officers and enlisted men of the army.

There are ten of these honors recognized by the army. Two are medals of honor, one a certificate of merit, and the other badges of historic campaigns.

Civil war—Campaign ribbon of equal sized bands of blue and gray. Indian wars—Bright red, with narrow edges of deeper red.

Spanish campaign—Alternating stripes of yellow and blue. This is the most familiar of all campaign ribbons.

Philippine campaign—Blue band in center, flanked by stripes of red, white and blue, the blue on the outermost edges of the ribbon.

China campaign (indicating service in the march to Peking)—Broad band of yellow with narrow borders of blue.

Ribbons for gallantry in action are worn farthest to the left, followed by campaign ribbons in chronological order.

POSTMASTERS NOT OUT OF POLITICS

Word Comes From Washington That the Old Order is in Vogue.

The Post's Washington Bureau. Washington, D. C., July 30.—Back into politics hob the postmasters. As a result the suffering members of congress from Montana and other states don't know whether to cuss or to be glad.

For months, which in some respects have been months of relief for the solons, it has been supposed that the presidential executive order which became effective April 1 removed postmasters entirely from the zone of politics.

Now it develops that postmasters are not out of politics, by a long shot. The revelation came the other day when a list of postoffice appointments in Montana, to say nothing of a similar batch for nearly every other state, was sent to the senate.

After much milling around and many legal consultations the postoffice department decided that a postmaster of the presidential class cannot go on being a postmaster forever, or as long as he resides on this mundane sphere and makes good.

And right there stalks in the specter of politics. If postmasters have to be appointed and confirmed every four years the party that happens to be in power when the expirations occur will have complete control of the postoffice pie counter.

FLORIDA BOOMING SWEET POTATOES

Jacksonville, Fla.—Making its final report in the form of a bulletin, a special committee appointed by the Jacksonville Real Estate board to investigate the feasibility of a large co-operative warehouse for storing, "curing," grading and marketing the sweet potato crop of Florida is advocating the erection of co-operative warehouses and of plants for the manufacture of by-products as well.

The report sets forth that the sweet potato can be grown in this state with approximately little labor and that it yields an enormous crop per acre. It adds that there is a waste of 30 per cent of the entire crop under present conditions, all of which could be conserved through "curing," drying and storing.
