### ISSUES A SECOND APPEAL FOR BOOKS

Contributors Urged to Have Their Donations at Library at Once.

Butte citizens are nobly responding to the appeal issued by Miss Gertrude Nichols, city librarian, for books to be sent to United States soldiers' camps. Fully 200 magazines and at least half that number of books have been received by the librarian. Although the response has been generous, Miss Nichols issued a second appeal today, asking those who desire to contribute to do so at once.

The books are being collected by the American Library association upon request of Secretary Baker of the war department. It is the intention of Secretary Baker to keep soldiers of Uncle Sam well supplied with books in the camps throughout the country as well as at the war front in France. Butte is expected to contribute its quota which has been fixed at 2,500 books. The quota must be raised by Aug. 15.
