

DAY LAST DAY TO ESCAPE DRAFT

Whose Names Are Posted Tomorrow Won't Be Accepted for Regulars.

Registrants who will receive a draft call for the first day's examination, tomorrow is the last day for enlistment. Many men whose names will be posted in the office of the county board tomorrow will not be acceptable to army officials after tonight. Expecting to send out notices to a number of the county men today, members of the county exemption board will have these men from enlistment as the notices are sent out. The official bulletin board of the exemption board as fast as notices are sent. The board is considered sufficient to bring, whether or not notices reach men they are addressed to. Recruiting Officer Harlan of the army this morning examined a number of men, all of whom may be accepted today. Recruiting Officer Foltz of the navy has applications for enlistment. He is allowed but three men each and sends this quota to Salt Lake each Thursday.

Choice Still Open.

A number of popular divisions in military service still are open for enlistment. Recruiting Officer Harlan now accepting men for the aviation service. This branch of the service has been closed for a few weeks, but the broadening of equipment during that time allows enlistments now. Mechanics and cooks, the men that keep an army "crawling," also are needed in the armies. Schools are being established to train men in these professions and applicants need not be men to get into the service in this branch.

From the national Red Cross headquarters comes the word that 50 experienced motor truck drivers, 20 help-and 10 expert mechanics are needed at once for service in France. It is asked that men beyond military age go for this service, to act without pay and to receive intensive training in their work. It is a work that is expected to recruit many men whose employers are willing to give them pay advance to help the Red Cross transportation and living expenses to be paid by the Red Cross.

In Coast Artillery.

Enrollment in the coast artillery is open now. Men chosen for this service must be fitted with some technical knowledge that will equip them to undertake the three months' intensive training. The men recruited are to go to Fort Winfield Scott, California. The rate of pay will be from \$10 to \$51 per month, with the usual allowances.



COUNTY TO BEGIN MAILING NOTICES

First Official Letters May Be Mailed Today—Examination Monday.

Later this afternoon county exemption board members expect to mail out the first draft call notices. Already more than enough names have been listed by the clerks to take care of the first day's examinations and the copying will be finished tomorrow night or Saturday morning. Men to whom notices are mailed this afternoon will report for examination on Monday. The county board members expect to finish medical examinations before next Wednesday night.

At the city hall a large force of clerks are working on the lists. City board members say that the first notices will be sent out on Saturday and the remainder on Monday and Tuesday. City examinations will start on Wednesday next week. The work of name copying at both the county and city offices is progressing at a favorable rate.

Swamped With Work. The old expression that "when it rains it pours" is being proven true to the local boards this week. Swamped with the work of getting out the final call lists, they now find themselves bound to add 10 per cent more work to their already arduous duties. The provost marshal, in instructions issued yesterday, declares that an added 10 per cent to the quota must be drawn to cover possible exemptions among the men sent to training camps. For Butte, this will mean the examining of more than 200 more men than originally figured by the city; and the handling of almost an added hun-

dred by the county. With a quota of 792 men, the city must now send 871 to training camp. With a quota of 261 men the county will now furnish 287.

In a communication received last night from Provost Marshal General Crowder, it is explained that miners will not be exempt as a class. District boards will pass upon separate claims for such industrial exemption and consider the need of the nation in determining the grounds for exemption. The question came up when the coal producers' committee of the council of national defense asked if coal miners would be exempt as a class. Crowder replied that no industry, including agriculture, will be a class exemption ground for a man seeking discharge.

With the near completion of the first call, attention is turning to the second call and its possible time. Secretary Baker, in a statement in the east a few

days ago, declared that only one more increment of 500,000 men will be called under the present law. He would not say when this call may be made. He also said there is no foundation for the statement of Senator Lewis that the second call will come in October.

May Call on All. Intimations have been given in the east in the past few weeks that, within the year, every one of the 9,000,000 registered men may be called upon to present themselves for examination for military service. Under the present law, the government is authorized to continue drawing men from the draft list to maintain an army of 2,000,000 men at maximum strength.

In September, when the conscripts are called out, there will be 1,250,000 men in the field. The second call for 500,000 men will raise the total to 1,750,000. Together with the 100,000 in

the aviation service and in other supplementary divisions, the strength will reach 2,000,000 men, the number which the nation will probably try to maintain in the field.

To provide for losses and wastage, officials estimate that one-third of the total of men, or 666,000, will be required each year.

Extra legislation may be needed, it is reported from Washington, before future draft calls are made. It is also pointed out that a new registration and new drawing may be necessary each year to determine the liability to service of men of military ages, this because some men pass the age of 31 each year while others accede to the military age who were minors the year before.

MORE PAVING IN BUSINESS SECTION

Council Serves Notice of Intention to Include All the Downtown District.

J. C. Maguire was awarded the contract for the paving of South Montana street at last night's meeting of the city council. He was the only bidder. Contracts for the paving of Broadway, Granite and Park streets will be let Friday night. Fred Saner and Maguire were the

two bidders for the paving of Park, Granite and Broadway.

To complete the downtown paving projects notice of intention to improve Main and Wyoming streets was given by the city council. Notice was also given for the paving of Granite street from Main to Wyoming street.

City Treasurer Neal A. Ward served notice upon the council that he will not recognize a warrant for the purchase of the proposed new fire truck. The city treasurer claims the fire department fund will not stand the strain of \$5,800, the amount estimated as the cost of the new apparatus.

Three bids were opened to furnish a machine for the police department. These range in price from \$2,000 to \$2,800. They were referred to the finance committee.

A request for an increase in salary of \$1 per day was received from the stationary engineers in the employ of

the city. The teamsters also requested the same wages to be agreed upon as are paid by private concerns. Both requests were referred to the finance committee.

That the walls of the city hall tower are being weakened by the ringing of the fire bell was the statement of the building inspector, who suggested discontinuance of the custom.
