INCREASE IN WAGES IS GRANTED BY TRUSTEES

Football for Coming Season Discussed at Weekly Meeting.

An increase in wages of 50 cents a day was granted to the members of the Workmen's union employed by the school district at the weekly meeting of the trustees last evening in accordance with the recent agreement made between the union and the Silver Bow Employers' association. The trustees were unanimous in actively supporting the football this year.

The change from Clark park was made necessary on account of the discontinuance of the street car service. Bills to the amount of \$9,144.50 were allowed. Payment of the labor bill of \$17,755.40 was authorized. Grounds surrounding the Grant school were ordered to be purchased for playgrounds.

BLAME U. S. FOR CHINA'S DECLARATION OF WAR ON TEUTONS

Amsterdam, Aug. 8.—Austro-Hungarian newspapers, according to a telegram from Vienna, view China's declaration of war as the work of the entente, especially President Wilson.

It is aimed as a blow at German and Austro-Hungarian business interests in China and to cast two troublesome trade competitors by furnishing the Chinese with a pretext not to pay their debts, rescind railway and mining concessions granted to Austrians and Germans, confiscate Austro-German capital invested in the country, seize their ships and intern their subjects.

STREET CAR MEN IN KANSAS CITY STRIKE

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 8.—A partial tie up of the street car lines of this city and Kansas City, Kan., was caused today by a strike called by operating employees who announced they were seeking the right to organize and to obtain the reinstatement of several discharged employees.

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FORMER DEER LODGE RESIDENTS ARE KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Deer Lodge, Aug. 8.—Harvey Fifer received a telegram Monday evening from Crystal, Ida., stating that Frank Hahn, his wife and two children, a son, Frank, aged 25 years, and a daughter, Elsie, aged 18 years, had met their death in a railway accident. The party were riding across the tracks of the Oregon Short Line in an automobile when Mr. Hahn, who was driving, lost control of the machine and an express train crashed into them. Two other children who were in the machine were badly injured.

Mr. Hahn, Sr., was a resident of the Deer Lodge valley for 20 years, going to Crystal 18 years ago. Mrs. Hahn was formerly Alice Fifer. After receiving the message Harvey Fifer and Delbert Fifer left Monday evening for Crystal.

MANY FAIL TO APPEAR FOR EXAMINATION

Deer Lodge, Aug. 8.—The examination of registrants in the recent draft was continued at the courthouse yesterday by County Physician G. J. Marquette, with a high percentage of the men claiming exemption as called the previous day. Of the 50 called to appear yesterday only 28 showed up, and the names of the others will be entered as those who were called and who were not exempted unless they appear before the time of grace expires. The third group of 50 are being examined today and the local exemption board will meet in about a week to pass upon the large list of exemption claims filed with them.

ACTION FOR DIVORCE.

Deer Lodge, Aug. 8.—Allan McNaughton of Garrison has commenced an action in the district court to obtain a divorce from Sarah J. McNaughton. The plaintiff alleges in his complaint that the two were married in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, in December, 1873, and that the defendant deserted and abandoned him in May, 1912. T. P. Shea is attorney for the plaintiff.

HAWAII'S EX-QUEEN SHOWS GREAT LOYALTY TO U. S.

Orders American Flag Over Her Home When Wilson Declares War.

Honolulu, Hawaii, Aug. 8.—Ex-Queen Liliuokalani of the Hawaiian islands has shown great loyalty to the Stars and Stripes since President Wilson signed the declaration of war against Germany. The ex-queen has always been loyal to the United States. Since 1893 she has resided in Washington Place, which was the home of her husband, the Prince Consort Dominis, who died at the beginning of her reign in 1891. Immediately after the declaration of war the queen called her chamberlain, Col. Curtis P. Iaukea, now secretary of the territory under appointment by President Wilson, and requested that an American flag be raised over her home instead of the customary Hawaiian flag. This was the first time an American flag had ever floated above Washington Place. The home was named in honor of George Washington when it was erected in 1848. The name Washington Place was officially recorded by the king of Hawaii of that period, Kamehameha III.

The building was designed and erected by a Capt. Isaac Hart, by trade an architect and builder for Capt. J. Donnis during the '40s. It took several years for construction, during which time Captain Hart voyaged back and forth to China, bringing with him sundry material toward its construction. His last trip in 1847, when he was lost, was to have brought his furnishings. The name Washington Place was given to it by the American commissioner at that time, Mr. Ten Eyck, and confirmed by the king.

BRUSSELS LAWYERS HONOR BURGOMASTER

HEUTE, AUG. 8.—Lawyers of Brussels have unanimously elected Adolphe Max, the heroic burgomaster of Brussels, imprisoned by Germans, as president of the bar association, according to news received here.

Burgomaster Max was arrested at Brussels Sept. 28, 1914, for his "irreconcilable attitude," and interned at Glatz.

NEW ZEALAND POLICE ON A DRIVE FOR SLACKERS

Military Service Law in Dominion to Be Strictly Enforced.

Wellington, New Zealand, Aug. 8.—(Correspondence of the associated press.)—The New Zealand police hereafter will enforce that section of the New Zealand military service law which aims at the enrollment of every man of military age in the Dominion. Policemen may escort citizens and make inquiries accordingly. Eligible men not enrolled will be liable to a fine of \$250 or three months' imprisonment. It is hoped by this step not only to insure that the name of every fit man is on the roll, but to detect men who have failed to comply with the military law (drafting by means of numbered marbles and card indexes). That is, every man who is not in military uniform will have to have either an enrollment certificate or a "leave pass" showing that he has been medically rejected. It is expected that the powers thus given the police will lead to many incidents.

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OFFERS THEOLOGY THESIS IN PLEA FOR EXEMPTION

Idaho Man Writes Book in Trying to Sidestep Army Service.

Spokane, Aug. 8.—Michael McGuiness of Malien, Idaho, who says he registered for the draft in Betsy precinct here, has written a "book" as a plea for exemption from the draft. The plea is probably the longest that will be filed in the United States by any man registered for the draft. The affidavit, which went to the county exemption board, but will be turned over to the city for reference to the proper district board, was duly sworn to by the author. His "book," as he calls it, is entitled "Unforeseen Happenings, or What the World is Coming To," or "The Reformation of the World Versus Abolition of the Political and Unionist Parties."

Mr. McGuiness dwells much on the evolution of mankind and sees a time when the "Ten Commandments" will be the laws of the nations of the world. Mr. McGuiness desires to be exempted for the theological reasons set forth in the "book," which contains 30 pages of closely written matter.

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ANGLES FOR GASES IN VOLCANO'S MOLTEN LAVA

Expert Does Some Scientific Fishing in Hawaiian Islands.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 8.—Dr. E. S. Shepard of the geological laboratory of the Carnegie Institute, who arrived here recently from Honolulu en route to Washington, did some scientific fishing while in the Hawaiian islands. Instead of hooking the wary fish he angled for gases in the molten lava of Kilauea from the rim of the volcano's great crater. Instead of a string of fish Dr. Shepard's "bag" consists of 20 sealed vacuum tubes containing the gases which will be subjected to a laboratory analysis. Describing his trip he said: "We wanted to find out what forces are at work inside Kilauea, making it a 'holing' volcano. To do this we had to analyze the gases inside the mountain. As soon as this gas comes into touch with the outside air it becomes useless for our purposes, as it burns. At the top of the volcano is the famous lake of molten rock. On its surface is a scum or crust. Under this crust of boiling matter is the gas. From time to time blue gas flames shoot up through the crust. "To obtain this gas and to analyze it we fastened vacuum tubes to the end of fishing rods. With these fishing rods in our hands we took up our position on the one to stable bank of the lake of molten rock. Whenever we saw a blue flame spurting up through the hole in the lava we dipped our vacuum tubes in, got the gas and sealed the tubes. It was a nerve-racking task, as the lake is in the habit of spurting up and throwing the molten lava over the banks."

Dr. Shepard says he has already determined that the gas in Kilauea is different from that of Vesuvius, Aetna and the Alaska volcanoes. It contains more sulphur, he says.

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SECOND YOUNG MAN IS ARRESTED AS SLACKER

H. H. Margolyes Arrested Short Time After J. F. Sullivan Was Arraigned.

H. H. Margolyes, a young real estate man of Butte, was arrested last afternoon by Deputy United States Marshal P. J. Moore. Margolyes is charged as being a slacker in that he failed to register on June 5. It is said that Margolyes recently signed a deed conveying property. Federal officials say that either the deed is invalid or Margolyes is of the age to register. J. F. Sullivan, a Butte attorney, was arrested yesterday on a charge of failing to register. Sullivan is in about the same position as Margolyes, fellow-citizen man. Either Sullivan has no right to practice law or is old enough for registration.

Both cases come up before Judge Bourquin in the federal district court next week.
