**FOUND IN CARE OF VICTIM'S PARTNER**

Mystery Surrounding Disappearance of De Saulles, Jr., Solved.

Mineola, N. Y., Aug. 8.—All mystery about John Longer De Saulles, Jr., the four and a half year old son of Mrs. Bianca De Saulles, who shot and killed her divorced husband last Friday when he refused to give up the child to her care, was cleared today when he was found in the care of G. Maurice Heckscher, De Saulles' business partner.

Counsel for Mrs. De Saulles was expected to make an appeal to Mr. Heckscher today, that the mother, who is confined in the county jail here on a charge of first degree murder, might be allowed to see her son. Should this appeal fail it was said legal action probably would be taken.

Mrs. De Saulles, who was said to be in a serious condition by three physicians who examined her, has been removed from the cell she occupied to a room in the sheriff's apartments of the building.

**GOVERNOR'S DEALINGS WITH BANK ARE AIRED**

First National Bank of Temple, Texas, Made Loans to State Official.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 8.—A brief reference to transactions by Gov. James E. Ferguson through the Temple State bank and the First National Bank of Temple was followed at today's hearing of Speaker F. O. Fuller's charges against the governor by the reading of documents relating to official action taken by the governor on legislation, and the retention of C. W. Woodman as state labor commissioner after his nomination had been refused confirmation by the senate.

P. L. Downs, vice president of the First National Bank of Temple, testified about some loans made to Governor Ferguson by his bank in 1913.

The governor gave three notes for \$5,000 each to mature in 1914, 1915 and 1916, Mr. Downs said.

**TOOLE IS ORDERED TO TAKE APPEALS**

City Attorney to Act as Representative of Provost Marshal.

George D. Toole, city attorney, was this afternoon named by Governor Stewart to take all appeals from local exemption boards to district boards where a dismissal charge is issued. Attorney Toole will act in these matters as the representative of Provost Marshal Crowder.

It is the duty of Mr. Toole, under the authority granted him by the rules and regulations prescribed by the president of local and district boards, to take an appeal from all decisions of local boards to the district boards having jurisdiction in all cases where certificates of discharge were granted and issued because of a claim filed for discharge under the provisions of subdivision (h) of section 26 of the rules and regulations, and that will include an exemption claimed by a married man whose wife or child is dependent upon his labor for support, or if the claim for discharge is filed in respect for such husband; also a claim filed by a son of a widow dependent upon his labor for support, or if the claim is filed in respect for such son by his widowed mother, or if the claim is filed for discharge by another person in respect of such son; also by a son of aged or infirm parent or parents dependent upon his labor for support, or if the claim be filed in respect of a son by his aged or infirm parent or parents, or if the claim be filed by another person in respect of such son; also the father of a motherless child of children under 16 years of age, dependent upon his labor for support; also if the claim

**FRED RICHARDS AGAIN IN TOILS OF THE LAW**

Fred Richards, the first man sentenced to the state prison by Judge John V. Dwyer, was released on Monday and today he occupies a cell in the county jail to face a charge of burglary. He was captured on E street about 10 o'clock last night and it is alleged that he had entered a house.

On Feb. 1 of this year Richards appeared before Judge Dwyer and after withdrawing his former plea of not guilty, entered a plea of guilty. In view of circumstances surrounding the case, he was let off with a sentence of not less than six months nor more than 18 months in the penitentiary. Last Monday he was given his liberty. In addition to facing a charge of burglary this time, he will also be charged with a prior conviction.

**MARINES EXPECT THEY WILL SOON FILL RANK**

Less Than Thousand Men Are Needed—Local Office Is Kept Busy.

According to word received today from Washington, less than 1,000 men are now needed to fill the ranks of the marines. How soon the ranks will be filled and what effect the filling of the number will have on recruiting in Butte, is not predicted by local recruiting officers.

Sergeant Harlan, recently in charge of recruiting in Butte, may return within a week, it is said. It is supposed that the army recruiting office will be open as soon as the draft examinations are finished over the country.

Brig. Gen. W. A. White, British recruiting officer of the United States, was in Butte yesterday for a few minutes on his way to the coast. Mr. White is busy opening up British recruiting offices in the United States, to enlist men who are British subjects and who have been in America since the early days of the war. There is no British army recruiting office in Butte, but regular army recruiting officers have authority to accept men for transfer to the British army.

The war department has provided a simple form of will for enlisted and drafted men. With the attestation of two witnesses, the following form of will is designed to fill the need of men in the hazardous service of war:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_ (name in full), make my last will. I give all the property of which I die possessed to my wife—or any other person, name to be given in full). I appoint my wife—or other person) executor of this will, with or without bonds. I give her power to sell all or any of my estate without an order of court and I revoke all wills by me heretofore made. I designed by my own hand, dated and signed by my own hand \_\_\_\_\_"

**TO TAKE UP QUESTION OF MUNICIPAL SCALES**

Council Will Consider Matter at Next Meeting, Says the Mayor.

Action to provide municipal scales for the weighing of coal will be taken within a few days, according to Mayor W. H. Maloney.

"Because of the threatened increase in the price of fuel many people have been storing up coal for the winter. Our object now is to see that everyone gets full weights," said the mayor. "The question of municipal scales will be taken up at the next meeting of the city council."

Health Inspector Jack Riordan, who has been delegated to the work of watching the coal dealers, reported today that scales about the city show a variance.

Their injuries were believed to be serious at first, but Dr. Maginn, the attending physician, announced today that they are both out of danger.
