**MARRIAGE ITSELF WILL NOT EXEMPT**  
Dependency of Wife Must Be Shown and Dates Are to Be Watched.

Marriage in itself is not a ground for the claiming of exemption, according to word received in Butte from Provost Marshal General Crowder. The actual act of dependency of the wife must be closely scrutinized in many cases, he says.

In discussing the subject the provost marshal says that a man whose wife is mainly dependent on his daily labor for support may claim exemption on that ground. But dependency is a matter of fact, he adds, and the rule does not ask "Is the husband, as a matter of law, liable to support the wife?" but does ask "Is the wife, as a matter of fact, mainly dependent on the daily labor of her husband for support?"

Only the exemption board may determine the answer to the question, and they decide from the affidavit proof offered. Where dependency is claimed and the circumstances show a marriage hastily consummated since July 29 by a man whose number is high on the available list the actual fact of dependency must be closely scrutinized.

Another statement in reference to the matter of marriage since July 29 is the section from the conscription act which says: "Any person who evades or aids another to evade the requirements of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor and local boards are authorized to warn persons who claim discharge on the grounds of marriage contracted since the date of the act that both parties are liable to prosecution under this provision if, in fact, the marriage was contracted solely with the intent to evade the performance of military duty."

Here, as a result of Nicholas' overthrow, posing as an assassin is a highly profitable, if transitory, branch of business.

Terrorists released from Siberian convict jails and exile villages are naturally made heroes of. They are given free train accommodations, free dinners, free clothes and gifts of money. When they reach their native towns they are acclaimed as martyrs of liberty, and they receive proposals of marriage from attractive and wealthy young women. As a result of this novel condition many enterprising citizens whose hands are innocent of anything grimmer than mud or ink, are posing as murderers of despotic officials. Women as well as men are entering the profession. There was announced that Catherine Smirnova, who announced that she had murdered M. Ivanoff, governor of Odessa. united if the American people will only convince them that this nation stands solidly behind its allies in this war and will not falter.

"The newspapers of the United States have a great duty to perform in presenting the situation in this country as it really is. Talk of peace at this time and arguments against sending out boys to France are utter lies. We must go through this war to the end and our citizens might as well make up their minds to that effect. Slacker, peace and home guard talk has no place in this situation at present.

**Change is Coming.**  
"I am greatly encouraged by conditions in Russia. They are becoming better all the time. Even during the four weeks that I was in Petrograd I noticed a great change. I spent virtually all of that time with the workers' council, which is really the government of Russia, and I know that the people are gradually getting behind the government more strongly each day. Of course they are a sentimental and peculiar people but they are anxious to make a fight for the right and if we will do our share they certainly will do theirs. The whole question of the future of Russia now lies with the United States."

**Transportation Problem.**  
James Duncan, who represented labor on the commission, expressed the opinion that development of railroad facilities is the greatest problem now facing the Russian people. Conditions in all other lines will work out well, he said, if the transportation problem is solved.

"The outlook for the new republic is bright," he said. "The people are pleased that the United States has gotten into the war and its entrance has had a wonderful effect on the morale."

"All they need is better transportation facilities to move troops, munitions, etc. They have plenty of munitions on hand and if they can solve the railroad problem they will fight like ....."

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**AMERICA'S ARMY TO BE ONE OF CAPABLE, OBEDIENT MEN BUT NOT AUTOMATONS, SAYS GEN. PERSHING**

Paris, Aug. 8.—Major General Pershing, commander of the American expedition in France, told the associated press today what he expected of America's conscript army. The general said:

"Our men must be in good physical condition, keeping their morals clean and thereby capable of meeting the trying conditions of modern warfare. The men must learn to obey orders promptly, implicitly and willingly, but not necessarily automatically."

"I object to the word 'automatic' because we do not want a machine-made organization, but an army of thinking men. Men with individual minds, fully capable and ready to assume command of units, should their officers be killed or incapacitated, as sometimes happens in trench warfare."

"The men must be made to realize that war is not sport or play, but serious work demanding the utmost energy and attention to insure success."

General Pershing likened army organization to a football team in which "each man is trained to perfection under strict discipline but is capable of brilliant action individually."

He added:

"We want our men trained the same way."

The general was optimistic and confident that America's army would give an excellent account of itself and would come up to the expectations of the other entente allies despite the tremendous amount of work necessary before active American participation in trench warfare was possible.
