

U. S. NOW POTENT FACTOR IN WAR

America Makes Itself Felt on Fifth Month of Entrance in Struggle.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 8.—Entering upon its fifth month of war, America found itself far advanced as a potent factor in overcoming Germany. About 400,000 national guardsmen are in arms, ready to move in southern camps, opening Aug. 15, for intensive training. The regular army, gradually filled with volunteers, is only 3,000 or 4,000 short of its complete quota, while the American flag actually flies over European land and sea.

Perishing's division is rapidly shaping for actual trench service. American destroyers prowled the U-boat zone, while scores of new destroyers are building.

Other things that America has done include the following:

Registered 10,000,000 youths, who are now being selected for the first national army of 537,000.

Seized 91 German ships, started repair work on all of them and actually put some into service.

Authorized without a dissenting vote \$7,000,000,000.

Appropriated \$750,000,000 for merchant shipping and \$640,000,000 for airship construction.

Agreed to loan our allies \$2,000,000,000 and advanced over half of it.

Sent a commission to Russia and France.

Began constructing 32 camps for soldiers.

Authorized and is enforcing embargo to keep food from Germany.

Launched great food conservation measures.

Gave \$100,000,000 to the American Red Cross and \$50,000,000 to the Y. M. C. A.

"War Brides." For the leading role in "The Eternal Sin" Mr. Brenon engaged Miss Florence Reed, one of the greatest favorites of the American stage. She will be seen as Lucretia Borgia, a woman whose history has declared to be one of the worst of her sex, but who, in this new version of her character, had many lovable qualities. The story is taken from a play by Victor Hugo, author of the great "Les Miserables," and contains no moment that is not intensely emotional.

Lucretia Borgia, according to the story, had avenged herself for the murder of her brother, by torturing to death five conspirators, and as a consequence five young kinsmen of these victims of the typical justice of the period swore to bring about the downfall of Lucretia. For a reason which none but she understands, Lucretia takes a deep interest in Gennaro, a friend of the five youths who have sworn the oath of vengeance. She secretly meets Gennaro, keeping her identity a mystery, but the five find them together and, despite her pleas, denounce her. Gennaro, who has been in the habit of seeing her from her room in the castle, is horrified. Meanwhile, the suspicions of Lucretia's husband, the Duke of Ferrara, have been aroused, and he believes Gennaro to be Lucretia's lover. Lucretia saves him from the duke's wrath, and tells him to fly from Ferrara. Then she arranges a terrible vengeance to be visited upon the young men who insulted her and turned Gennaro's affection to loathing. The manner in which Gennaro himself becomes involved in her plot brings the story to a conclusion which is sensational in the highest sense of the word.

In addition to Miss Reed, Mr. Brenon has enlisted in the cast such photodrama favorites as William E. Shay, who was the prince in "A Daughter of the Gods"; Richard Barthelmess, who was the youngest son in "War Brides"; Alexander K. Shannon, who played the king in the same production, and other artists who have been seen frequently in Brenon productions. The scenes are all of unusual beauty and the general effect is one of spectacular magnificence. The new Rialto organist, Louis Dimond, arrived last night. Dimond studied in Paris and Berlin, and his engagement previous to coming to Butte was at the Hippodrome in New York. He is one of the few really great organists, and thoroughly understands the mammoth orchestral organ. In securing his services Manager Jensen believes that he has added another attraction in keeping with his policy to secure the best music possible. "The Eternal Sin" will be the feature until Sunday.
