

BRITISH LABOR PARTY ANNOUNCES PEACE IDEALS

(Continued from Page One.)

The Russian people on the destruction of czarism and warmly welcome assistance to the cause of human freedom in council no less than the battlefield that is now being accorded by the American people. It decries war as being waged against the peace-loving peoples of the world, and continues: The conference asks the peoples of several nations, particularly socialist labor comrades of Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey, whether it is not possible for the red action of working classes of the

world to bring this monstrous conflict to a summary conclusion conformable to the principles of the international.

To Prevent War.

After welcoming the formula of no annexations and indemnities of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates the memorandum declares: "Of all war aims none is so important as that there should henceforth on earth be no more war. Whoever triumphs, the world will have lost unless some effective method of preventing war can be found."

For this, reliance is largely placed on the "complete democratization of Germany and Austria-Hungary, which now cannot fail to place themselves in line with other civilized nations, on a frank abandonment of every form of imperialism, on the suppression of the secret diplomacy, on the placing of the foreign policy under the control of

elect legislators, on the absolute responsibility of the foreign minister of each country to the legislature, on concerted action for the limitation of armaments and the abolition of profit making of armament firms."

League of Nations.

It is further declared that the essential condition of a treaty of peace will be the establishment of a "supernational authority or league of nations adhered to by all present belligerents, while every other independent state in the world should be pressed to join."

The scope and constitution of the proposed league are set forth, including machinery for settling international disputes judicially and mediately, and the formation of an international legislature wherein every civilized state will be represented. The memorandum condemns "the

crime against the peace of the world," whereby Alsace and Lorraine were torn from France in 1871, and demands their restoration.

For All Races.

It recognizes the necessity of safeguarding the legitimate interests: Italians in the Adriatic and the Aegean; of a just settlement of the question of Poland and other states where independence has been temporarily destroyed.

For the Jews equal citizen rights are demanded and hope of a free Palestine is expressed, together with freeing of Mesopotamia, Armenia and Arabia from Turkish rule and placed under the government of a league of nations. All dreams of an African empire, the booty of any nation, should be abandoned, the memorandum asserts, and suggests that all present colonies be transferred to the proposed

league of nations. Food supplies, after the war, and the prevention of unemployment are dealt with and projects of an economic war after peace are condemned. It calls for a full inquiry into alleged acts of cruelty and violence during the war and calls attention particularly to the destruction of lives and property by the "inhuman and ruthless" submarine warfare. It proposes a court of claims for such cases, with suggestions for restoring devastated areas. The reconstruction of the socialist internationalists, to discuss and deal with all questions of international importance, is declared desirable. Finally it is claimed that an agreement of the warring governments is only possible by a free and frank discussion of each other's claims and desires. Such a discussion the socialist and labor men of all countries are urged to demand.

MELONAS IS SUING FOR A PARTNERSHIP ACCOUNTING

Peter K. Melonas today, through Attorney Edwin M. Lamb, brought suit against George Papp, Othon Cacharelis and Nick Telegadas, asking for a partnership accounting, the appointment of a receiver and for judgment in favor of the plaintiff for the amount alleged to be due on the partnership by the defendants.

According to the complaint the plaintiff and the defendants entered into partnership to conduct a saloon business at 22 East Park street July 21, 1916. On July 1 of this year, according to the plaintiff, the defendants sold and assigned to F. A. Sutton a certain interest in the business without the consent or approval of the plaintiff. The plaintiff says that he

is informed that a half interest was sold for \$4,000. Melonas says that the defendants have failed and refused to give him an account of the business, and he believes that the defendants received \$2,500 over and above their just proportion. It is also asserted that the defendants continue to collect debts due under the partnership.

AMERICAN AMBULANCE MEN ARE WOUNDED

Paris, Aug. 10.—Price McQuillan of Overbrook, Pa., and Wayne Vetterlein of Philadelphia, members of section 22 of the American Red Cross ambulance, have been seriously wounded by a shell while loading wounded at an advanced post on the battle front.
