MONTANA MEN ARE GIVEN COMMISSIONS

Forty-six From State Pass Examinations at Officers' Training Camp.

COMMISSIONERS CUT ONE HALF MILL FROM TAX LEVY

The County This Year Will Be \$911,385 as Against \$881,184 Last Year. Despite Enormous Increase in Value of Taxable Property, Indications Are That the City Will Cut Its Levy.

County of Silver Bow county has reduced one half mill, or one cent, from the tax levied for the year 1917. The increase in property value is some \$21,000,000, which is the tax levied for the county purposes 12 of 12 1/2 mills, as provided by the levy with the increase in valuation will make the county this year approximately 100 more than last year. The levy this year, it is estimated, is in a total of \$911,385 to the county, as compared with \$881,184 last year of 12 1/2 mills.

Commissioners took the view that the county with much less than last year, a large increase in the expenditure for a new pest house, the advertisement of the hospital, construction of bridges and salaries for the large increase in force, due to the local situation of the one half tax comes off the poor property, have reduced the tax levy from 14 1/2 mills to 12 1/2 mills this year. In the Rocker school district there is a balance on hand of between \$6,000 and \$7,000 and therefore it was decided not to make any levy on that district this year.

The rate for the fire districts this year in the county will be: Centerville, 9 mills; Boulevard, 10 mills; McQueen addition, 5 mills; Meaderville, 5 mills; Pittsford, 6 mills; East Butte, 8 mills. Before adjourning yesterday afternoon the board of equalization took up the matter of the petition of James A. Murray to disallow the tax of \$75,000 mortgage on the Broadwater property at Helena, which Mr. Murray claims was cancelled previous to March 1 of this year, the date of making the assessment. In addition, the county authorities discovered a mortgage of \$13,000, belonging to Mr. Murray, which is in the name of E. L. Chapman, formerly cashier of the Murray bank. The records in the case were produced and it was shown that Chapman had no real interest in the mortgage, which belongs to Mr. Murray.

Late yesterday afternoon Attorney Tom J. Davis and J. R. Wharton appeared before the board and asked that the Young Men's Christian association building be exempted from taxation and the request was granted.

The application of Mrs. W. L. Crede for a reduction in the assessed valuation on her property at 309 West Broadway from \$6,000 to \$4,000 was denied. The board decided, however, to reduce the assessed valuation on her automobile from \$1,000 to \$500 on account of the auto being several years old.
