TO SUPPLY ARMS TO HOME GUARDS

War Department Issues Regulations Under Which Supplies May Be Had.

Special to the Post. Washington, D. C., Aug. 25.—The war department now is ready to furnish rifles, to the extent that its supply will permit, to home guards that may be organized in Montana, and it awaits only a requisition by the governor of the state, according to information just obtained here. The well-known Springfield rifle of .45-caliber will be used in filling these requisitions.

The government's plan of supplying rifles is set forth officially for the first time in a letter written by Brig. Gen. William Crozier, chief of ordnance, to a Florida member of congress. In this letter General Crozier says:

"Referring to your communication, together with forwarding letter from George G. Herring, I beg to advise that the act of congress approved June 4, 1917, provides for the issue of rifles and ammunition to home guards having the character of state police or constabulary, or such home guards as may be organized under the direction of the governors of the several states. Regulations have been approved by the secretary of war to govern the issue and are now being printed. A copy will be sent to you in the very near future. They provide that issue may only be made to the governors of the several states for use of home guards qualifying within the terms of the act, actually engaged at the direction of the governors of the several states in the protection of United States property, property in course of manufacture for the United States and means of transportation, including rights of way of railroads, bridges, etc."

"In the specific case of Sanford, Fla., the subject of Mr. Herring's inquiry, it is suggested that he communicate with the governor of the state and set forth the needs of the Sanford home guards for rifles for the purposes herein enumerated. The request for the issue must be made by the governor, since the act provides that the supplies must be requisitioned for by him. To the extent that the governor of Florida may make request for the issue of equipment for use of the home guards of the state, including those of Sanford, for the purposes named herein, it will be the endeavor of the department to comply with his request, so far as limited supplies permit. The issue will be confined to the Springfield rifles, of caliber .45. The Krag rifles have been ordered to be used by the secretary of war in drilling and training the enlarged army. The governor need not wait formal requisition blanks. If he will set forth the needs for the purposes herein named in a letter, same will receive attention."

The information contained in this letter applies to every state in the union, but the supply of Springfield rifles on hand probably will not permit the department to fill all requisitions that will come in. All the department can do is to make the supply stretch as far as possible.
