CHILD LABOR LAW IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL

Federal Statute to Go Into Effect Tomorrow is Declared Void.

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 31.—Federal Judge James E. Boyd today declared the Keating-Owen child labor law unconstitutional. Injunction proceedings which resulted in Judge Boyd's ruling were brought by Robert H. Dagenhart and his sons, Reuben and John, against a cotton manufacturing company to prevent the company from dismissing the two boys, minors, from the company's mill at Charlotte. Federal District Attorney William C. Hammer also was made defendant. The law, which becomes effective tomorrow, prohibits the employment of any child under 14 years of age in any factory, workshop or mine, and any whose products are to be shipped in interstate commerce and requires that the working day of children 14 to 15 years old shall not be longer than eight hours. Reuben Dagenhart is under 16 and John Dagenhart under 14. The father contended he has a right to their wages until they are 21 and that as the North Carolina law allows 11 hours a day, Reuben has a right to work more than 8 hours a day, while John has a right to work in the mill, although under 14, because the state law permits it.

PAUSE IN THE MAJOR EFFORT ON ALL FRONTS

The Germans have shown some activity in Alsace, making an attack near Hartmannsweilerkopf, which the French repulsed completely. **British Casualties.** Although the British armies on the Franco-Belgian front were engaged in much heavy fighting during August, including the great attacks of the Anglo-French forces in Flanders, the casualties were notably less than during July. The British figures for August, given by London today, total 59,811 as compared with 71,832 for July, a falling off of more than 12,000. The casualties, indeed, have been on a descending scale during the entire period since the active campaigning season opened, the high mark being set in the May figures which totaled 112,233.

GERMAN PATROL AT CERNY FORCED BACK

Paris, Aug. 31.—"East of Cerny a German patrol which attempted to approach our lines was repulsed by our fire," says today's official statement. "There was active artillery fighting on both banks of the Meuse. In Alsace an enemy attack south of Hartmannsweilerkopf was repulsed completely. There is nothing to report from the remainder of the front."

GERMAN RAID AT LENS REPULSED

London, Aug. 31.—The repulse of a German raid on the front below Lens is reported in today's official communication. The statement follows: "The weather is unsettled. During the night the enemy heavily shelled our forward positions near Arleux-en-Gohelle (five miles southeast of Lens) and at an early hour this morning attempted to raid our lines. The German troops were repulsed completely."

GERMANS RETAKE SOME GROUND FROM BRITISH

Berlin, Aug. 31 (via London).—Operations undertaken by the Russians yesterday at Narocz Lake, 60 miles southeast of Dvinsk, resulted unsuccessfully for them, says today's official report from the eastern front. A portion of the ground recently gained by the British south of Leatelet has been recaptured by the Germans, the war office announces.

BRITISH CASUALTIES FOR MONTH OF AUGUST

London, Aug. 31.—The total of British casualties on all fronts as reported in August is 59,811 divided as follows: Killed or died of wounds: Officers, 1,278; men, 10,942. Wounded or missing: Officers, 4,122; men, 43,469.

THREE ANACONDA MEN RECEIVE COMMISSIONS

TO ASK PROTECTION OF FEDERAL TROOPS

San Francisco Street Car Concern Will Ask for Aid to Break Strike.

San Francisco, Aug. 31.—The United Railroads may ask for federal troops to aid the police in guarding its property in connection with the strike of 1,750 platform men, company officials indicated today. They said the problem of protecting employees is serious, as more than 29 substitutes brought here from other cities are in hospitals suffering from injuries received in street riots yesterday, despite the utmost efforts of the police to repress violence. Apprehensions also were expressed as to what labor day may bring forth. General Manager Von Phul declared today that his company's service is nearly 90 per cent normal and that "with adequate protection normal service could be maintained."
