### BODY OF AN AMERICAN AVIATOR WASHED ASHORE

Papers Indicate Remains Are Those of Julian Biddle, a Philadelphia Youth.

The Hague, Sept. 4.—According to a message today from the village of Egmond-Aan-Zee, north Holland, a body has been washed ashore there on which was found a letter containing a certificate of enrollment in the French legion under date of June 1, 1917, in the name of Julian Biddle, born in Philadelphia on April 18, 1890, profession, banker. There was also found an aviator's flying certificate from the Aero Club of America dated Oct. 11, 1916, and a service order of instructions to fly from St. Paul to Dunkirk on Aug. 17, 1917, together with 365 francs in French bank notes.

A Paris dispatch on Aug. 22 announced that Julian Biddle, son of Arthur Biddle of Ambler, Pa., a Yale graduate who joined the Lafayette flying squadron early in August, had been killed in service in August.

### COUNTY EXEMPTION BOARD FAILS TO GET ITS ORDERS

warded to the district board a list of 18 men who are volunteering to go together with other men who are certified for service because they did not claim exemption. But the district board at noon today had failed to order the county board to call the 18 volunteers for enrollment or to name any other 18 men who are to go at that hour. Should present orders stand, the county board will face an order for 18 men tomorrow night without having received the names of these men from the state officers. It is impossible, the county board members say, for them to legally name the men who are to leave Butte this week. This is the work of the adjutant general.

### Naming the Men.

Acting upon the presumption that the adjutant general will name volunteers whom the local board has accepted for this week's quota, the Butte city board has notified 40 men to report Friday night for muster and to hold themselves ready to leave for the training camp on Saturday evening. The city board expects that the state body will notify it to send these 40 men who are reported to have "enlisted" for enrollment this week. Yet it is recognized that the adjutant general and district board may name any 40 men on the list certified from the city. Because of this selective power of the district board, the county has refused to notify men to report for enrollment until the names of such men are certified by the adjutant general. Should the county board be called upon to send men tomorrow night, the men will not be able to secure even 24 hours notice before they must leave. If orders come today to call certain men, the red cards will be mailed out at once.

### As to Aliens.

Even in the face of the report that the district board has upheld the Butte city board in its refusal to grant exemption to aliens, the county board will not draft aliens. "The law is very plain on the subject of aliens, and we do not care to make any ruling directly in contravention to that law," said one of the county board members this morning. "Two different notifications have been received from the process marshal in which the points out that aliens must be allowed exemptions. We will be glad to see some law passed that will take the aliens into the service, but until that law is passed we shall strictly adhere to the present law."

### Many Men Far Away.

Board members of both the county and city are trying to get some definite ruling on the cases of men who are called for service but who are now far from home. Some men in Butte and Silver Bow county have recently left this country to get work in other states. Many of these men write to the boards that they are ready to go to American Lake, but that they are unable to finance a trip back to Butte. If they go, it is said, transportation will have to be furnished from the place where they are now at work. The local boards have no authority to send transportation to such men.

"Yet we can hardly demand that these men return to Butte for enrollment," said a board member today. "Many of them are closer now to the training camp than to the city of Butte. We think these men should be furnished transportation from the place
