Maintained Johana Sagar has Permitted Law to Be Violated.

Jhana Sagar has been notified to before the county commission the morning of Sept. 11, at 10 o'clock, for the purpose of answering to complaints which have been made to the character of a saloon kept in her name at 2302 Walnut

It is alleged that in addition to allowing idle and dissolute persons to frequent the place a young girl is engaged in dispensing the liquid refreshments.

MUNICIPAL SPUDS THE CHICAGO PLAN

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Municipal Murphies. That's what Chicago is going to eat this winter. This became known today when it was announced that the middle western section of the national food administration had decided to store \$1,000,000 worth of potatoes here. The working capital, it was said, will be advanced by the city in the form of a loan, probably \$200,000 for initial purchases and freight. The potatoes will be sold at cost, about \$1.50 a bushel. The first money from sales will be used to pay off the debt to the city. As other sales are made, the money will be devoted to purchasing more potatoes.

DANISH LEADER PRAISES THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE

C. Stauning Declares the Note is a Highly Promising Sign.

Copenhagen, Sept. 4.—C. Stauning, socialist member of the Danish cabinet and leader of that party in parliament, finds much to approve of in President Wilson's reply to the pope's peace proposal. In a statement to the associated press Minister Stauning said: "I am glad to have an opportunity to say a few words about President Wilson's answer to the pope, particularly as I have learned that a misunderstanding has spread in regard to my feeling toward the United States. "I am of the opinion that President Wilson's answer to the pope's message is a highly promising sign and I see from it what I have expected that Mr. Wilson does not wish the war to be continued to the end where there will be victors and defeated."

The paragraph of President Wilson's words which oppose a violation of the people's sovereignty, the imposing of indemnities, the splitting up of countries and the making of an economic war will be read with joy by everyone wishing a happy and lasting peace. I hope that Mr. Wilson's wise utterances may find echo and show their influence in other belligerent countries. "The president's wish that peace and its guarantee may be established by the people will further encourage the democratic parties of Europe to powerful efforts for a democratizing movement which the people wish and the result of which must be parliamentarism. "With the greatest expectation I

look forward to the consequences of the American president's words and know that not only my party, but the whole Danish people, share my hope that humanity soon will be relieved from this terrible war and the world guaranteed against new wars and the violations of right."

MANY INVEST MONEY IN CITY WARRANTS

Employees Are Paid in Cash by City Treasurer Neal A. Ward.

Policemen, firemen and other city employees are being paid in cash this month because of an arrangement made between the city treasurer, Neal A. Ward, and persons in the city who desire to invest in city warrants. There is plenty of cash on hand, according to the city treasurer. This will mean a convenience to city employees who have at times been forced to accept discounts upon their salaries.

CONTINUE SCOLLARD CASE UNTIL SATURDAY

The hearing on the application to make the temporary injunction permanent in the suit brought to prohibit the school trustees and the county treasurer from paying Alice B. Scollard salary as a public school nurse was to have been heard before Judge John V. Dwyer this morning, but a continuance was ordered until Saturday. It is understood that the school board has recognized the correctness of the contention that Mrs. Scollard, not being a registered state nurse, cannot legally occupy the position and is not therefore now on the pay roll. It is expected that on Saturday a stipulation will be filed dismissing the case.
