STREET PAVING STARTS MONDAY

Granite Blocks Will Go Into the Discard—Park Street to Be the First.

Monday will be a day of days in the history of street improvements in Butte. At 8 o'clock the first actual work of tearing up the granite blocks in the downtown section will be started.

City Engineer "Bud" Ellis has been notified by Manager J. R. Wharton that the street car company is ready to start its part of the work and a gang of men will be on the job at 8 o'clock Monday morning to tear up the tracks on the south side of Park street between Main and Montana streets.

When the new tracks are laid the contractor will start the work of replacing the blocks with bitulithic. But one side of the street will be finished at a time to allow traffic to proceed uninterrupted.

Within a few days the work of replacing granite street will be started. The city engineer hasn't much hope of seeing other than the two streets mentioned finished this year.

MOTORCYCLE MADE IMPORTANT BY WAR

Harley-Davidson Men Here in Conference—Factory Man Makes Statement.

That the real importance of the motorcycle was not felt until the present European war, is the opinion of E. J. Mueller of the Harley-Davidson factory, who is in Butte attending a meeting of distributors from all parts of Montana, North Dakota and Wyoming.

"The side car attachment to the motorcycle has revolutionized the industry," said Mr. Mueller. "But the real value of the motorcycle was not felt until the great war broke out. It is now one of the chief equipments of the great armies across the water."

"The United States officers are now using motorcycles with side car attachments. Sergeants drive the machines while the officers sit in the side car. This means that many drivers are needed from this country. Three hundred experts have already been furnished from our factory."

POLICE ON CAMPAIGN AGAINST SEDITION

TO STABILIZE PRICES IN LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY

Washington, Sept. 7.—The closing sessions of the National Conference of Livestock Raisers, called by Secretary Houston and Herbert Hoover, were devoted to a discussion today of the effect that government purchasing on behalf of the allies may have in stabilizing meat and dairy products prices.

Herbert Hoover has told the delegates that price-fixing for meat and dairy products was beyond the authority of the food administration and inadvisable, in view of the failure of the plan in Europe.
