**EXEMPTION PLEAS TO THE PRESIDENT**

Final Judge in Cases Involving War Industry Workers.

Butte, Sept. 12.—More than 100 pleas for exemption from military service for army exemption on the ground that the claimant is indispensable to a war industry, appealed to the president, the final judge of such cases, were on file today at the Provost Marshal General's office. The appeals are being examined by General Crowder, on whose recommendation the president will act. The general laid out today on the fact that only exemption claims may be made by the president from disqualification and that personal hearings by authorities acting for the president will not be given.



**STUDENT AVIATORS IN COLLISION IN THE SKY**

Both Are Killed When Planes Meet at Altitude of 500 Feet.

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 12.—Colliding 500 feet above the ground while flying in practice flights, First Class Privates Edward M. Walsh, Jr. of Oakland, Cal., and Theodore B. Lyman of St. Helena, Cal., fell to their deaths today at the North Island army aviation day. Both Walsh and Lyman were student aviators and attached to the reserve signal corps of the United States army.

According to the official announcement of the accident made by Colonel Dade, commanding officer at North Island, Walsh and Lyman collided in mid-air while flying at a "blind angle."
